
Mrs Chinniah, the Nursing Manager, presented surveyors with certificates and gifts wrapped with love from all staff.

Where to from now? Documents containing findings by the COHSASA Surveyors will now be taken to COHSASA Data Department for processing. In about six weeks, the documents will be sent back to the surveyors, who will in turn recheck the information, and then send the information to the Head Office of the Health department. After three weeks, the documents will be sent to Addington Hospital for comments, and provide feedback to COHSASA. Finally the report will be sent to COHSASA Technical Committee which will make the recommendation to COHSASA Board on accreditation status.

It was clear from the briefing given by the surveyors that we have all that it takes to win the Accreditation again . "Your QIPs are a first class... just the way you have put them together", said Prof. De Groot. Dr J Hurst indicated that one "unique thing that the surveyors found about us is the strong clinical participation".
