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CJM Hospital Back Care Week 2021

Many of us take priority in caring for our nutritional needs, ensuring we get enough physical activity and taking the time to look after our mental health. But what do you do to take care of your back and other joints?

When you hear the phrase 'back care', you probably think about trying not to tweak a muscle while gardening or focusing on lifting with your knees when carrying heavy items. But joint and muscle pain, or musculoskeletal (MSK) conditions aren't only prevalent in our personal lives; they're also extremely common in the workplace.

Since back pain is one of the most common condition faced by Healthcare workers and patients. Charles Johnson Memorial Hospital and Physiotherapy department hosted a back care awareness campaign on the 06th October 2021. The aim of the awareness was to prevent and alleviate back pain to all staff members and patients experiencing it. During the session numerous back care tips were shared, which included posture correction principles with activities of daily living such as standing, walking, sitting, driving, sleeping, working postures and heavy lifting. Exercises were demonstrated and mats were provided during the awareness program.

Audience members were given pamphlets as well as booklets to follow along with the presentation and exercise programs given. Hospital staff members and patients that attended the program were very impressed with the content shared, and were keen on practicing what they have been taught going forward. Refreshments were provided to all present at the end of the event.

The 16 Days of Activism for No Violence against Women and Children Campaign is a United Nations campaign which takes place annually from 25 November (International Day of No Violence against Women) to 10 December (International Human Rights Day). Other key commemorative days during this period include World Aids Day on the 1st December and the International Day for Persons with Disabilities, on 3 December of every year.

MEC for Arts, Culture, Sport and Recreation Hlengiwe Mavimbela led the campaign that was held at Ntinini playground under Nquthu subdistrict on 26 November 2021.
