Subject : Notification of COVID-19

Background

Notifiable Medical Conditions are diseases that are of public health importance because they pose significant public health risks that can result in disease outbreaks or disease epidemics with high case fatality rates both nationally and internationally. The International Health Regulations, 2005 (IHR) and the National Health Act, 61 0f 2003 in South Africa require the rapid detection of public health risks, as well as the prompt risk assessment, notification, verification and response to these risks. COVID-19 is a category 1 Notifiable medical condition (NMC). All patients who are under clinical suspicion or have a laboratory confirmation of Sars-cov-2 infection must be notified by the diagnosing clinician or the designated NMC focal person at the diagnosing health facility, as per NMC regulations, which are legislated by the National Health Act.

Notification Process

All suspect, probable and confirmed cases must be notified utilising one of the following platforms:

Complete Electronic COVID-19 case notification form (use NMC APP or NMC Web Portal)

OR

Send completed COVID-19 case notification form to <u>NMCsurveillanceReport@nicd.ac.za</u>
AND local district CDC coordinator.

All updated information regarding the notified case, must be edited on the electronic platform, or an updated COVID-19 case notification form must be sent to the email

addresses stated above.

Persons at a highest risk are those who have an acute respiratory illness and who, in the 14 days prior to onset of symptoms, met at least one of the following epidemiological criteria:

- (i) Were in close contact with a confirmed or probable case of SARS-CoV-2 infection; OR
- (ii) Had a history of travel to areas with local transmission of SARS-CoV-2; OR
- (iii) Worked in, or attended a health care facility where patients with SARS-CoV-2 infections were being treated; OR
- (iv) Admitted with severe pneumonia of unknown aetiology.
