She also taught children who were there about their rights as well as rules and guidelines they need to adhere to in order to exercise their rights fairly.

Every child has a right to family care if a child is removed from the family environment the child should get basic nutrition, shelter, basic health care services and social services a child has a right to be protected from maltreatment, neglect and abuse.

On the 22nd of June 2018 Ceza Hospital in association with Society For Family Health (SFH) performed another successful Medical Male Circumcision on more than 170 males which included grown ups as well young boys from surrounding schools, they all came from different areas around Ceza. This initiative by the Department of Health is specifically aimed at reducing risk of contracting HIV, however HIV Positive men are also encouraged to get circumcised as well. Circumcision also comes with many health benefits which include reducing partners chances of getting cervix cancer, the penis becomes easy to clean and it stays odour free and lowers your risk of penile cancer.
