
TB AWARENESS



Tuberculosis (TB) is a global disease, found in every country in the world. It is the leading infectious cause of death worldwide. The World Health Organization estimates that two billion people—one third of the world's population—are infected with Mycobacterium tuberculosis (Mtb), the bacteria that causes TB. Each year, 9.6 million fall ill from TB and 1.5 million die. TB is an airborne disease that can be spread by coughing or sneezing and is the leading cause of infectious disease worldwide. It is responsible for economic devastation and the cycle of poverty and illness that entraps families, communities and even entire countries. Among the most vulnerable are woman, children, and those with

HIV/AIDS. There is growing resistance to available drugs which means the disease is becoming more deadly and difficult to treat. Dannhauser CHC took TB awareness/ Integrated Health promotion Campaign to the community by visiting Hattingspruit on the 20th of March 2018 and Koppie Allen on the 27th of March 2018. A total number of 124 patients were screened for TB, 66 were screened for HIV. 3000 male condoms and 1100 female condoms were distributed in both the days. Vitamin A was given to 21 children and 11 were dewormed. The facility Management would like to thank all staff members that took part in this outreach as well as the Community Health workers who assisted with organising the community of Hattingspruit and Koppie Allen. Creating awareness on TB was also done in all our waiting areas as patients in waiting areas were taught about the signs and symptoms of TB as well as adhering to medication.







WORLD HAND HYGIENE DAY







Improving hand hygiene among health care workers is the single most important intervention in reducing the spread of infections. Washing our hands frequently and well is one of the preventive health practices we have, with benefits ranging from protecting us from the common cold and slowing the spread of deadly antibiotic-resistant infections. But despite the strong consensus in the medical community about the benefits of hand washing, there's still a lot we don't know about how to, best deploy this potentially life-saving habit.

This is why year after year on the 5th on May we become part of the world in reminding health care workers as well as the community the importance of washing hands frequently and well. Usually we focus on clinical staff when talking about hand hygiene as we see them as the ones that have physical contact with patients, however this year 2018 we decided to cut across all departments within Dannhauser CHC. All staff members were educated on the proper way of hand washing and those that did well by following all the steps in hand washing were awarded with certificates. Departments were also urged to decorate their departments so that even the patients that were visiting will also learn the

Child Protection week is a time to shine a spotlight on issues facing young South Africans under the age of 18. Child Protection Week is from 27 May –03 June 2018. Children's Rights are included in our Bill of Rights and this was an important development for South African children, many whom had suffered greatly under apartheid.

Children need special protection because they are the most vulnerable members of our society. They are dependent on others—their parents and families—for care and protection.

On the 29th of May 2018 the Department of Social Development invited stakeholders from the Christian Organization, Department of Education, SASSA and Department of Health (Dannhauser CHC) to be part of an awareness for school children from Zizuzele Primary School, Mnyamande Secondary and Mana High School. The main aim of the awareness was to tackle issues that put children's lives at risk as well as informing learners about services provided by different departments that will assist the children should they face any challenges. The Speaker from DSD Mrs Gumede said the theme for this years Child protection Week is "LET US PROTECT ALL CHILDREN TO MOVE SOUTH AFRICA FORWARD". Mrs Gumede said that awareness needs to be raised as there are various forms of child abuse taking place in our communities like sexual abuse which is a violation of children's rights and is usually done by people the children trust and respect. She said children should be taught at an early age not to allow anyone to touch them or promise them goodies for favors. She requested that all people take responsibility in protecting children from abuse, neglect, exploitation and other forms of violence and ill-treatment. Our School Health Team together with OMN Makhoba gave health education on drug abuse, sexual abuse and teenage pregnancy. OMN Makhoba stressed the importance of young children using the health facilities so that they can be advised accordingly should they be abused or involved in sexual activities.

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SECOND SET OF TWINS FOR DANNHAUSER CHC

Mother of twins could not stop praising the staff of Dannhauser Community Health Centre for successfully delivering her babies as she says, she was not aware that she would be getting twins but our Maternity staff made the whole experience a joyful one. On the 15th of June 2018 Miss Gugulethu Hlongwane, 29 year old, G4P3 who was 37 weeks pregnant was admitted in our Maternity (Labour ward) as a normal pregnancy. Our Advanced Midwife B.T Mkhize says that Gugulethu came to the facility already in labour and she progressed to deliver a baby boy who was born at 17H42, BWT– 2000g, cephalic presentation, with a good APGAR score, to her surprise the second twin (boy) was born at 17H45 BTW-1500g, also with a good APGAR score but this time this twin was breech presentation.

B.T Mkhize said that as surprised as she was by the second baby she quickly had to pull herself together and assist the mother who was also shocked that she was having twins but with the help of PN NNE Mbatha and PN N Mokoena they were able to deliver healthy bouncy baby boys. Speaking to Gugulethu after the delivery she said "she doesn't know how she will repay the staff members who helped her deliver her set of twins as she was not aware that she was pregnant with twins because she has booked late for her pregnancy and could not get an ultrasound done". The babies were seen by Dr Sangweni and they were in a satisfactory conditions, but needed to be transferred to Newcastle Regional Hospital for further management. On follow up, both the mother and the twins were well. The CEO Dr PZ Mabaso congratulated the mother and thanked the staff members for a job well done.

This is however a second set of twins for the facility as in March 2018 Ms Ntombiyoxolo Madela a 29 year old also delivered a set of boy twins who are also doing very well.
