KNOW YOUR STATUS

The Princess Park Stadium was filled with the youth of Estcourt who came in numbers to attend HIV & AIDS Youth Awareness Campaign that was organized by the VCT team in collaboration with ARV Clinic on 30 November 2007.

This event was an initiative by Estcourt Hospital to encourage the youth to go for Voluntary Counseling and Testing so that they know their status, and whether positive or negative, they can start living more healthier lifestyles. Furthermore, it was also directed at di-stigmatizing HIV & Aids so that the youth is more accepting to people who are infected and thus encouraging disclosure without fear of discrimination.

Speaking at the event, our guest speaker Mrs Zodwa Dladla eluded that there was a need for the youth to assume a more active role in the fight against HIV and Aids and also encouraged them to learn more about the pandemic since information helps one to make informed decisions.

There was a mobile testing facility, a mobile clinic, and Ambulance services on sight. Also pamphlets were distributed.

Dignitaries from Umtshezi Municipality, officials from Education, Social Welfare, Home Affairs, SASSA, SAPS and Correctional Services and NGO's came to support the initiative.

Entertainment was provided by, among other artist, L'vovo and Beezory who further emphasized the need for the youth to go for testing so that they can lead more healthier lives.

I sit at the Medical Managers office, I notice that its bigger than mine, more fancier and has air conditioner, then it hits me: Medical Manager vs PRO? No contest!! He sits just few feet's away from me wearing that thing doctors wear (see picture) in his neck. Then I ask....

PRO: Doc, I'm told you leaving?

MM: That is correct..

PRO: Where to?

MM: Dustan Furrell Hospital in Hibberdene,

South Coast, Portshepstone.

PRO: Why the move?

MM:sometimes one needs new challenges and a change of scenery...

PRO: Explain 'new challenges'?

MM: Among other things, I will initiate an ARV

PRO: Now what challenges do we face at Estcourt Hospital from a medical point of view?

programme, the hospital specialises in TB.

MM: Shortage of doctors, which makes it hard to cover all our satellite clinics....also, the increasing number of patients that are initiated

For ARV treatment. We have +3000 patients on ARV and only 1 doctor. According to ARV norms, there must be 1 doctor for every 500 patients meaning we need at least 6 doctors for ARV only.

PRO: How many do we have currently and how many should we have according to our staff establishment?

MM: We have 11 and that includes 3 community service but excludes sessional doctors, we suppose to have 23 doctors.

PRO: What would you say you achieved during your reign as Medical Manager?

MM:...When I came here, all wards we run by sessional doctors, doctors, especially sessional did not sign attendance registers and they had no contracts, that has changed.

Editor: in the interactions that I have had with Dr Mthethwa, he has come across as a progressive thinker, I have no doubt that he will be greatly missed by all our staff. Doc, thanks for the experiences and GOOD LUCK!!!!!

THE PRESIDENTIAL IMBIZO AT UTHUKELA DISTRICT

DAY 1, October 6

Residents of Uthukela District Municipality exploited an exceptional opportunity to fire questions at President Thabo Mbeki, his ministers and their provincial counterparts, led by Premier Mr Sbu Ndebele. This rare moment presented itself during the presidential imbizo during the weekend of 6-7 October.

Impoverished communities came out in numbers to plea for service delivery during the two day imbizo at Uitvaal Stadium (Indaka) in Ladysmith.

When the public was granted an opportunity to ask the president some questions and raise their concerns, communities complained about lack of access to basic needs such as water, housing, education and job opportunities. The impact of HIV and Aids, now a major cause of deaths in the Uthukela District, featured as one of the crucial concerns.

Meanwhile, President Mbeki shared the Premier Sbu Ndebele's earlier sentiments in which he noted the presence of white people in the audience. 'We should learn to live and work together to build our new South Africa' President Mbeki said while addressing the masses.

President Mbeki said they noted peoples concerns over service delivery and these will be addressed.

DAY 2, October 7

Wembezi's E-Section in Estcourt came to a standstill when President Thabo Mbeki made a door-to-door visit in the township during his Presidential Imbizo.

President Thabo Mbeki conducted his walk-about visit in various homesteads in the township during the second day of his Presidential Imbizo in Uthukela District.

The communities followed Mbeki as he criss-crossed the township visiting homesteads. Themba Mhlungu, 57, said he only wanted to shake the presidents hand in order to have luck. 'We have never seen the president in our area and we are happy that he has taken time to visit our homes'. Mhlungu said.

After addressing the masses at Wembezi E-Section President Mbeki proceeded to Ladysmith Townhall to meet with leaders and prominent businesspeople to come up with strategies on how they will go about addressing the issues raised by the communities during the Imbizo at Indaka and also the door-to-door visit at Wembezi E-Section.

After what seemed like a lengthy discussion with leaders and business community, Mbeki later left Uthukela area.
