

COMMUNITIES KEY IN THE FIGHT AGAINST HIV/ AIDS

The journey and contribution by different stakeholders in the fight against HIV/AIDS has been a long and painful one. The introduction of HIV treatment programme marked the beginning of a news dawn in which life expectancy of those living with the virus was increased, thereby easing the pain in different communities that had to bear the brunt of losing their loved ones to Aids related illnesses.

Estcourt hospital commemorated World Aids Day on the 05 December 2019 at HAST Clinic with an aim of mobilizing the communities to unite in the fight against HIV/AIDS pandemic hence the theme "Communities Make the Difference ". Placing people living with and affected by HIV at the centre of our efforts to defeat this pandemic has proved to be effective even during early 2000 when members of Treatment Action Campaign (TAC) mobilized themselves in pressure groups and advocacy organizations demanded government to provide life-saving HIV treatment. That bold action paved the way for the HIV treatment programme success story. All speakers during the event urged attendees to educate communities to stop stigmatizing and discriminating those living with the pandemic. If they feel welcomed in society adherence to treatment will be increased and more people will get tested for HIV thereby assisting the institution to reach 90 90 90 targets set in 2014 by United Nations programme. Males were encouraged to go for Medical circumcision programme as it assists in decreasing the chances of transmission. Dr. Kekana said that the institution is concerned about an increase in a number of teenagers that fall pregnant and challenged the communities to talk openly with adolescents and young women about issues of sexuality and resultant risks of unprotected sex.

At the end a candle lighting ceremony was done in remembrance of all those that lost the battle against HIV/AIDS led by Mrs. Lukhozi. It was an emotional moment but words of encouragement from all the speakers affirming that there is light at the end of the tunnel were their beacon of hope.

HAND WASHING CAMPAIGN, A GREAT SUCCESS



Prevention & Control team conducted the IPC awareness at the hospital and clinics to educate patients and staff about the importance of IPC practices as well as the segregation of waste. Importance of good hand washing with soap was emphasized as vital in to successfully break the cycle of infection. According research proper handwashing can reduce the rate of diarrheal infections by almost 50% and acute respiratory disease by up to 25% in children. These figures are a indication that good handwashing and hygiene are significant and a link to health.

During the campaign the following activities were done among others; demonstration of handwashing practices, patients also demonstrated hand rub techniques after being taught and they were also told about proper waste segregation. At the end of the campaign a feedback session was done to staff in different wards and clinics on all gaps identified so that they can come up with quality improvement plan to turn the situation around.
