Operational Manager for Injisuthi Clinic Sr. Ganes took it upon herself to lead from the front and she informed the management that she was going to be the first one to do it. Management was not sure if she knew what was expected of her and to their surprise she exceeded their expectations.

Open day is about giving the community, served by the clinic, information on how the clinic operates, the services it provides and also the projects that are underway and Injisuthi Clinic Open Day covered exactly that. The community was informed of the services that are provided at the clinic and how to go about accessing them, even the visiting doctor was available and he explained to the community on how frequent is he visiting the clinic and the procedure to be followed when one wants to be seen by him.

Attendance was good and there was no excuse for not coming, because parents were requested to come with their children and the jumping castle kept them busy the whole day, while parents were getting much needed information about their clinic. The community was also afforded an opportunity to ask questions and to visit different service station to get as much information as possible. Health services like Pap Smear were provided on the day and the community took advantage of them.

THE CORRECT USAGE OF THE MEDICATION WAS REITERATED DURING THE PHARMACY WEEK

The Pharmacy Week was from the 05th to 11th September and the Pharmacy Team took advantage of it by educating patients, clients and stakeholders on the correct use of medicines. Presentations were done throughout the week covering important topics. Pharmacy identified a gap that even if it is explained to patients on how the medication should be taken, most of them forget and are unable to read medicines labels correctly and that was explained in detail to them. Patients were also educated on asthma in general as well as the use of inhalers. Epileptic patients are mostly likely to have seizures and significant information on epilepsy and what to do when someone is having seizure was shared will all present. Diabetes was also covered and patients were taught on how to correctly use insulin pens or needles.

The reality is that for any medication to be effective, it has to be stored correctly. Patients were urged to follow instruction on how to store their medicines and also to complete their medication where necessary. Once the medication has been used, patients were requested to properly dispose of it, hence it is even written on all labels of the medication that it should be kept away from children. Dangers for improper disposal of the medication were explained. At the end of each presentation, hampers full of goodies were given to patients and cooler bag hampers to those who answered questions correctly.

CHRONIC MEDICINES ACCESSIBILITY TO BE IMPROVED THROUGH CCMDD

The exponential increase in the total number of patients diagnosed with chronic diseases within the Estcourt Sub District has resulted in an influx of patients coming to the clinics to collect their medication monthly. This has contributed to long waiting times and high nurse workload. Estcourt Hospital Pharmacy Team came up with a Quality Improvement Project to change the current situation around. Three clinics namely Fordeville, Ntabamhlophe and Injisuthi were identified as pilots sites for the new project for which medication was pre-packed and dispensed to respected sites closer to where patients live. They only came to the clinic when they were due for review and referred back to the pick-up points. This project started in March 2014 and had problems at first but has yielded positive results.

Centralized Chronic Medication Dispensing and Distribution is the same programme but has been made better to meet patient's needs. Medipost has been given the responsibility of pre-packing and dispensing the medication at the pick-up points among other things. CCMDD has been launched in most of our clinics and communities

served by the already launched facilities have been afforded an opportunity to suggest areas to be made pick up points, and once assessed and have met minimum requirements will be accredited.

Once the process has been finalized patients will be down referred to those pickup points to collect their medication, since in the interim all launched facilities have a designated area where medication is collected by those patients rolled out on the programme. This programme seeks to reduce long waiting time, and to decrease the number of patients coming to facilities for services.

Malnutrition continues to undermine the efforts by the institution to decrease under 5 mortality rate. An increase in a number of children with severe malnutrition warranted intervention and the Malnutrition Campaign was taken to the area on the 06th July 2016, to provide health education to the community and also do the health screening and immediately refer those children that need medical attention.

Malnutrition is caused by a decrease in food consumption and essential nutrients that results in under nutrition and an increased risk of severe illnesses and a likelihood of death in young children. The campaign targeted children under five years, pregnant, lactating mothers, school children and the community in the area.

Turnout was good and health education covered important topics, like breastfeeding, complimentary feeding, food safety and hygiene. It was stressed that herbal intoxication is also a contributing factor to child mortality, and the community was urged to take their children to the clinic if they are sick, so that the child can be assisted as soon as possible. Community Health Givers prepared an educational stage play, which entertained everyone and at the same time sent an important message across. At the end the community was given a chance to ask questions and some of the myths were corrected. Screenings were then done on children that needed it.
