
Happy reading !

## Programme of Celebration of Women's Day held in our Out Patient's Department

This was definitely a Women's Day event. Mrs KV Msomi was the programme director and female Pastor Msani from the Free Methodist Church said the opening prayer. Introduction & welcome was by Mrs Whitfield who briefly introduced the events and mentioned the available resources around at hospital such as the Crisis Centre to attend to needs of Women and Child abuse. PMTCT programme prevention of mother to child transmission and the Drop in Centre. day clinic for TB and HIV patients for counselling and ongoing treatment. Sr FN Duma spoke about domestic violence in summarised versions as physical violence, verbal, emotional violence,, sexual abuse or rape, economic and financial abuse. She mentioned how the Crisis Centre could assist and what women should do to speak out against violence. **CPN G Nteyi spoke about Prevention of** mother to child transmission and the availability of Neviropine. The management of child and mother post delivery as well as options available within the PMTCT

Ongoing counselling, immunization, monitoring of child developmental stages and treatment of minor ailments.

Jabu Mthethwa (Aids Councillor Member) gave an extremely motivational speed as a person living positively and openly with HIV. She raised awareness about the importance of having a balanced diet and further emphasized that the stigma attached to the disease and the fact that being diagnosed with HIV/AIDS does not mean a death sentence but a chronic disease like diabetes and

hypertension. She further emphasised the importance to have knowledge of the disease, to be brave and that support is a great help.

Unfortunately this was Jabu's last speech. Her life was tragically cut short when she was shot whilst on duty in the Drop in Centre. This came as a great shock to us all.

'Jabu you may be gone but you'll never be FORGOTTEN. You will be greatly missed by the hospital staff, community and province as a whole. Rest in peace.'

Miss APN Mbambo spoke about HIV/ AIDS and TB. She mentioned mode of transmission, signs, symptoms and positive living. Safety measures abstinence of youth, diet and nutrition. She advised of the availability of a full time doctor at the institution and management of HIV/ AIDS and TB patients.

CPN P Ngcobo was guest speaker and summarised the available resources at the hospital.

Sr TG Mkhize gave the vote of thanks on behalf of management and thanked all for attendance and the guest speakers.

## Report on District Substance Abuse Essay Competition



Due to the high incidence of drugs and substance abuse amongst school children across the entire province—it was decided at provincial level to create an awareness amongst primary school children even before they start indulging in drugs and even before they commence with high school.

The provincial health promotion committee which is presented by Mrs M Munsami and other school nurses from DC 21 decided to carry out a substance abuse essay writing competition amongst 12 primary schools in each district. The main aim of this competition was to create an awareness amongst primary school children. The title of the essay was - "Substance Abuse in Schools".

The 12 schools were chosen as 4 urban, 4 peri-urban and 4 rural.

The substance abuse task team was formulated, comprising of representatives from various departments such as education, SAPS, social welfare, school health, mental health And rehabilitative services. Various workshops and awareness days regarding substance abuse were carried for teachers, pupils and the community at large. Essays were collected from schools and adjudicated by members of the task team. Strict criteria was followed in adjudication. Some of the essays presented were of a high standard.

The district function was held on the 31 July 2003 at the Port Shepstone Clinic Hall where prizes and awards were given to the children. The event was a great success with 11 of the 12 schools attending. Speakers for the day were from health, education and SAPS. Prizes were awarded to first, second and third in each grade. The provincial substance abuse essay competition takes place on the 8/10/03 at Stanger. Pupils that obtained first position in each grade would participate.

### Victim Empowerment Programme

Following the taxi disasters at Malageni, Umzinto, which claimed the lives of 14 school children on 30 April 2003 there was a critical need fo the formulation of a victim empowerment structure in the UGU—District. Caregivers, victims, and family members will be assisted in the process of dealing with the crisis or disaster. A forum is being formed in the UGU district that includes members from UGU sub-districts, who will in turn form forums at sub-distinct levels.

The forum consists of stakeholders from SAPS, EMRS, Department of Education, Department of health, Social Welfare, Psychologists, community members, NGO's, CBO's and municipalities. This victim empowerment programme is focusing on trauma prevention strategies including psychological, physical and social factors, such as domestic violence, rape, floods, faction fight victims. We welcome all categories of staff.


#### MENTAL HEALTH

The new Mental Health Act no. 17 of 2002 has been published. Health workers are advised to update themselves with the act. Training is going on regarding the integration of mental health and PHC. This enables PHC nurses to attend mental health cases more effectively and efficiently.

Two professional nurses namely, Mrs PE Shezi and Mrs TC Khwela from GJ Crookes District Health have already attended a one week training in mental health integrating with PHC these nurses are in turn conducting 5 day workshops at intervals. They are training the PHC nurses and are willing to extend the programme to hospital staff as well. The next training / workshop will take place on the 20-24th October 2003.
