#### **DISASTER PREPAREDNESS**

Grey's hospital conducted an external mock disaster drill on 06 September 2019, involving 10 trauma patients (5 red codes and 5 yellow codes) arriving at the facility via a bus. The simulation was effectively organized by Mr D Naidoo, Dr Assari and Emergency department personnel.

The drill exercise is effective at improving individual and institutional preparedness for responding to emergencies and are found to be effective at improving personnel knowledge of emergency activities, policies and procedures and improving overall competence and confidence. #### **CELEBRATING HEALTH EVENTS AT GREY'S**

#### MENTAL ILLNESS AND DISABILITY MONTH IN JULY 2019

#### "EMOTIONAL WELLNESS THROUGH THE LIFESPAN" UKUPHILA NGOKWEMIZWA IMPILO

"Emotional wellness is the capacity to successfully handle life's stresses and includes an overall experience of well being in what we think, feel and do".

The Grey's hospital team comprising of Social Work and Clinical Psychology aimed to educate and raise awareness of emotional health in the context of lifespan development. Following the theme, "EMOTIONAL WELLNESS THROUGH THE LIFESPAN" UKUP-HILA NGOKWEMIZWA IMPILO YAKHO YONKE", a pamphlet and visual aids were developed and displayed in Outpatients Department and used for outreach, patient education and training activities. Outreach: Pre-visit needs assessment took place with external stakeholder organizations - Seventh Heaven (Home of the Aged); John Peattie House (for persons with intellectual and physical disabilities) and Msunduzi Hospice on 24 June 2019. The outreach to these organizations was then planned and implemented on 25 July 2019. Social Work and Clinical Psychology facilitated awareness and education with staff and residents at John Peattie House and Seventh Heaven Home. The outreach was well-received and we thank the stakeholder organizations, staff and residents for their willingness to participate and their hospitality. We thank Mr Chris Gouws, Elize Steyn, Lydia Kruger and their staff for welcoming us to Seventh Heaven. We also thank Mr Eugene Pillay, Sr Summers, Sr Dicks and the staff at John Peattie House, and Msunduzi Hospice for accommodating our networking pre-visit. Patient education: Awareness talks for the Pain Clinic patients were facilitated by the team at the Pain Clinic on 28 June 2019 and were well-received. Thank you to Dr Cairns, Sr Thomas and the Pain Clinic for accommodating the programme. Training event: As a part of the health event, a training hour was co-organized with Occupational Therapy as part of the Occupational Therapy In-service Training for 12 July 2019. Dr Rob Pluke, a private practice counselling psychologist, presented on the topic 'Parenting the sensitive child' for Occupational Therapy, other allied health and attendees from other hospitals. The team and colleagues from Pain Clinic, Social Work and Clinical Psychology also attended the Psychiatry Academic Day on 19 July 2019 at Townhill Hospital. We were inspired to stand against stigma and advocate for changing minds about mental illness.

#### **WORLD BREASTFEEDING WEEK**

World Breastfeeding week was well organized and celebrated at the Gynaecology Outpatient Department in the week of 01 –07 August 2019. The mothers who attended the breastfeeding week activities were provided with pamphlets and educated about the importance of breastfeeding. They were informed that Breastfeeding has many health benefits for both the mother and infant. Breast milk contains all the nutrients an infant needs in the first six months of life. Breastfeeding protects against diarrhoea and common childhood illnesses such as pneumonia, and may also have longer-term health benefits for the mother and child, such as reducing the risk of overweight and obesity in childhood and adolescence. World Health Organization recommends that infants should be exclusively breastfed for the first six months of life to achieve optimal growth, development and health. Thereafter, to meet their evolving nutritional requirements, infants should receive nutritionally adequate and safe complementary foods, while continuing to breastfeed for up to two years or beyond. Evidence suggests that educational interventions during pregnancy (e.g. peer counselling, lactation consultation or formal breastfeeding education) may increase the duration of breastfeeding.





#### 16 DAYS OF ACTIVISM FOR NO VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN AND CHILDREN

The events took place on the 5<sup>th</sup> December 2019 at GOPD Clinic and the Lodger Mother's facility. The theme for this year: Enough Is Enough – End Gender-Based Violence. The events aimed to educate the public (women in particular) about violence and gender-based violence. It also focused on educating and empowering the audience on how to report such incidents and seek professional help. During the events, the audience was given an opportunity to participate in discussions around the subject of violence and was encouraged to ask questions. It was apparent that most patients who come from deep rural settings had a clear understanding of what gender-based violence was, but the majority of them still felt scared to report violent-related cases to authority figures, as they were reportedly financially dependent on their abusers.

In conclusion, both events went well and the attendance was good. However, there is still a lot more that needs to be done at an individual, family, community, institutional and state level in order to curb the scourge of gender-based violence in society today. From these events, it is apparent that rural women need more empowerment opportunities such as employment opportunities, so that they can be able to sustain themselves, make healthier life decisions and avoid staying in abusive relationships due to financial dependence.






#### TO GREY'S HOSPITAL
