

Each year we commemorate World TB Day on March 24 to raise public awareness about the devastating health, social and economic impact of tuberculosis (TB) and urge acceleration of efforts to end the global TB epidemic. Despite significant progress over the last decades, TB continues to be the top infectious killer worldwide, claiming over 1,5 million per year. Drug-resistant TB (DR-TB) poses a major health threat and could put at risk gains made in efforts to end TB.

UMvoti sub-district held various TB related campaigns during the month of March to raise awareness of TB and dis-miss misinformation and myths to empower communities with knowledge and early seeking behavior. The national theme for the commemoration of World TB Day 2024 was, 'Yes! You and I Can End TB'. In line with the global community, the theme from last year, 2023 was retained for this year's commemoration. The theme aims to encourage individual action to contribute to the national effort against TB. It also emphasizes the importance of being accountable as an individual and as part of a collective.

"You and I" is a statement of intent designed to encourage individuals to take charge of their health in line with "Cheka Impilo" objectives, as well as the country's endeavor towards ending the missing TB clients.

WELLNESS FORUM LAUNCHED IN UMVOTI SUB-DISTRICT

The Sub-district launched a health promotion and wellness forum during the beginning of the year. This forum will look into the prevailing high numbers of teenage pregnancy under the sub-district and craft interventions to address these health concerns. The forum is a multi-stakeholder forum, which includes Operation Sukuma Sakhe (OSS) and various government departments, civil society, faith based organisations and Non-Governmental Organisation (NGO's) and Community Based Organisation (CBO's). GREYTOWN DISTRICT HOSPITAL OBSERVED WORLD HAND HYGIENE DAY

The power of hand hygiene emphasised as a diseases control measure

The Umvoti sub-district joined the global community in observing World Hand Hygiene Day to raise awareness about the importance of hand hygiene in preventing the spread of diseases.

World Hand Hygiene Day is observed annually on 5 May to improve hand hygiene standards at home and the workplace thereby protecting health and care workers and communities from infections and curbing the spread of harmful germs.

The 2024 theme is "Promoting knowledge and capacity building of health and care workers through innovative and impactful training and education, on infection prevention and control, including hand hygiene".

"It is critical that the health and care workers and the public at large make hand hygiene a non-negotiable routine in their daily lives as a simple, yet powerful tool to safeguard their wellbeing. Through advocacy and education, we can foster these good habits that help prevent the spread of diseases," emphasized, Sr Kholisiwe Shoba, Infection Prevention and Control Nurse.

Hand hygiene has proven effective as a preventive measure during the COVID-19 pandemic and the recent Cholera outbreak in certain areas of the country.

It is important to always remember that when practiced properly, hand hygiene can help to prevent the spread of viruses including respiratory and diarrheal infections at home and in public settings. Hands should be washed with a soap or alcohol-based sanitiser for a at least 20 seconds, covering all surfaces of the hands including the palms, back of hands, between fingers, back of fingers, thumbs, fingertips and wrists.

"As we enter the winter months which often sees an increase in cases of flu infections. The message around hand hygiene is even more urgent as a proactive measure to protect ourselves and loved ones to stop the spread of respiratory infections such as influenza," pointed out Sr Shoba during the awareness campaign.



Umvoti subdistrict was routinely inspected by the Office of Health and Standard Compliance (OHSC). The main aim of the visit was for compliance Inspectorate, certification and enforcement. This included inspection of Umvoti subdistrict health establishments to assess compliance with national health systems, norms and standards, certify health establishments as compliant or non-compliant with prescribed norms and standards and taking of enforcement action against non-compliant health establishments. The inspection started on 15/01/2024 to 19/01/2024 where Ehlanzeni Clinic, KwaSenge clinic, Muden clinc and Greytown Hospital were inspected. The inspection started at the clinics where OHSC inspectors visited the above mentioned PHC facilities then progressed to the Hospital assessing compliance with national health systems, norms and standards, certify if the facilities are compliant or non-compliant with prescribed norms and standards. The inspection included visiting every single department within the institutions, looking for documents, doing observations, staff interviews, documents audits and capturing on the system to give that particular functional area a score. Finally, the outcome according to the final report from OHSC all the facilities inspected (Ehlanzeni, Kwasenge & Muden) are compliant with excellent grading.
