Hospital Services to the People - MEC



On 07th of November 2020 the MEC for Health KwaZulu-Natal, Ms Nomagugu Simelane-Zulu visited the area of eKuthuleni under Mthonjaneni Local Municipality with the iSibhedlela Kubantu Program. The program was aimed at bringing all the mobile hospital services, such as Dental Clinic, Eye Clinic, MMC Clinic, Medical Officers (Doctors), Physiotherapist, Occupational Therapist, Social Worker, Dietician, and All Primary Health Care Services to the door step of the community of eKuthuleni Area.

The MEC encouraged the public to continue observing all the COVID-19 precautions such as wearing masks and washing your hands regularly and using an alcohol based hand sanitizer to stop the spread of virus. The MEC continued by encouraging women to do Cancer Screenings regularly to prevent growth. The service is available for free in all the PCH Clinics and it for free.

The MEC handed over wheelchairs to patients that were identified by our Community Health Worker (CHW) in eKuthuleni Area. The mother of one of

the wheelchair beneficiaries was in tears of joy and thanked the MEC for intervening. It will make her life easier now because the wheelchair will allow her child to move easily with no assistance.



The MEC thanked all the staff and stakeholders that contributed to the success of the day. She also thanked the community for coming out in numbers to access the free health services.

Our Outreach team went out to train community members on hand washing using basic products that are normally available at home, such as soap and water. The Department of Health KZN observes a concern that community members believe that only alcohol based sanitizers are effective in stopping the spread of COVID-19. It is important to note that soap also has the same effect as alcohol based sanitizers.

Washing your hands properly is one of the most effective ways you can help prevent and control the spread of COVID-19 and other diseases. Good hand hygiene will reduce the risk of COVID-19 being passed from person to person.

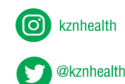
