The medical team at Mseleni have had a great year under the able and enthusiastic leadership of our team captain, Victor Fredlund. Support from the other seniors at Mseleni - for him and for us - has been excellent and those of us who are new or junior on the staff have much benefited from the help of Jenny Nash and Kobus Viljoen. These senior citizens (metaphorically speaking, of course) are an extremely valuable asset, and it never ceases to surprise me that the battery of questions they are asked daily are always enthusiastically and patiently answered.

We were also very fortunate to have been joined this year by two English/Scottish doctors (they have never clarified which), the Clancy's, who are here in a missionary capacity for two years. With the new batch of community service doctors arriving shortly, they will soon join the ranks of the "senior citizens", much to their horror, no doubt. The remainder of the team comprises three community service doctors, some of whom have taken to the rural medicine approach better than others (it seems it is still only me who prefers to see a procedure done before doing it myself – perhaps a habit I can blame on my gender). And of course, the team would be incomplete without my long-suffering

husband who has followed me around for the last few years (and I hope will continue to do so indefinitely).

Things have run smoothly with our routine of daily (not very) grand ward rounds, ward duties, out-patients and clinic work (interspersed with the regular joint replacements and the occasional laparotomy for full term extra-uterine pregnancy). The greatest, and most exciting, challenge we have faced this year is the establishment of our Antiretroviral Programme. The programme is running both from the hospital and our out-lying clinics, and the learning curve has been steep. The programme still faces many challenges – insufficient human resources to deal with the overwhelming number of sick patients being a significant one – but it has brought hope where there previously there was none.

And so, some of us are moving on to other (cooler, no doubt, given the average temperature here) climes but the senior citizens and team captain remain to welcome the new batch of doctors and to see this beautiful, and blessed, hospital into the new year.

COHSASA EXTERNAL SURVEY VISIT

We had COHSASA External Surveyors who came to assess the hospital. They were assessing different service elements. There were 27 service elements which were assessed, 21 of them achieved 80% and above.

6 service elements achieved 70 and above according to the preliminary report .The great challenge is to improve what has been achieved. There is still a huge room for improvement .

She stressed that if someone is under the ARV treatment programme, commitment is the key in order to avoid defaulting and ARV programme is a lifetime commitment.

One cannot stop taking after the improvement of his or her CD4 count has improved, After a lengthy deliberation by Dr. Nash, a chance was opened for clarity to issues about HIV/AIDS and questions asked by the staff. I can say the day met the needs of the people. Special thanks must go to Mseleni Aids department team for organising such an important day
