PHARMACY WEEK-11-15 SEPTEMBER 2006

The message for this year's pharmacy week was:

KNOW YOUR MEDICINES

The following topics were covered during the week:

- Know what medicines you are taking and why.
- Know how to store your medicines
- Know the chronic disease
 medicines
- Know your TB medicines
- Know your antiretroviral medicines (ARV's)
- Know what to do with expired or left over medicines

On daily basis these were being covered when we dispensing medication to patients, but during this week this was done differently especially for chronic patients. The patients were chosen randomly.

Two patients at a time and they took turns explaining what they think the medicine was for, in relation to the problem they presented to the doctor, after hearing their view the medication was explained to them in a proper way. It was interesting to find out that most patients especially the Grannies and Grandpas knew their medication better than the youth.

On Friday we had a candlelight ceremony at the pharmacy, Nursing Staff was invited and were given a candle. They were asked to bring their candles and light it up from a blue candle that they had at pharmacy. Afterwards they asked for inputs from Nursing staff on how can they improve their services in a way that will be helpful to everyone especially the patients.

The ceremony symbolized that Pharmacy Staff have to work hand in hand with Nursing Staff and Doctors and also appreciate them for work that they do in the



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INFECTION CONTROL SERVICE HANDWASHING AWARENESS WEEK

Awareness started on 11 to 15 September 2006. Committee Task Team was elected for the preparation and monitoring of awareness:

These were Task Team from the Infection Control Committee. Staff was mobilized through posters, intercom, sectional visits. The first two days allocated for In-service training which was conducted in both languages, IsiZulu and English. On Monday was English and on Tuesday it was isiZulu, conducted by NC ZUNGU (ICP) .Music was rendered during these sessions and the song was composed by the Task Team and the music was related to hand washing .

On the third day on Wednesday, Hand washing Surveillance was conducted where the team was taking hand swabs from the clinical staff who were conducting or performing procedure which needs aseptically technique. The area was targeted randomly. The following specimens were taken to Laboratory for culture.

OPHS: Medical Officer - Lumba punche

Female: Registered Nurse -Administration of Intravenous antibiotics PAEDS: Student Nurse - Put intravenous line to child CDC Service: Registered Nurse –Taking blood specimen from client Food Services Aid , chopping of vegetables

Results were as follows:

On the 4th day it was evaluation of handwashing per Handwashing Procedure. Hand Procedure and Policy was used as a Hand washing monitoring tool. Criteria was random selection.





