

World Pregnancy week takes place form 12 February -16 February on the department of health awareness calendar. World pregnancy week aim is to create awareness on issues surrounding pregnancy in the community.

On 16 February 2018, staff of Pholela CHC had a community dialogue with the patients at the waiting area to ensure that pregnancy awareness week messages are cascaded to the masses. The message was clear to the public, "We all have a role to play during the pregnancy phase of a women and have to offer our support."

The community was informed of the different trimesters a women goes through when she is pregnant. It was also explained that she has to go to the clinic for Antenatal visits. During this time the women should avoid stress and keep doctors appointments to monitor the growth of the unborn child and wellness of the mother. Fathers were encouraged to assist mothers during this time to accompany her for doctors visits and help around the house with small chores

During the stages of pregnancy, it is crucial that mothers maintain a healthy diet. The nutritionist reminded mothers to stay hydrated and eat healthy foods consisting of protein and energy. This helps both the mother and child to grow and have energy. The community was warned about dangers of smoking and drinking while pregnant...



Furthermore, the clients were asked to take part in a series of questions and answers to determine if they had taken into account what was told on the topic of pregnancy awareness. The community answered all the questions that were asked and were able to ask questions themselves on pregnancy related matters. It was great to see the community being involved and taking note of their roles as community members. Some of the questions raised were very fruitful to everyone

All pregnant mothers and newly mothers who were present at the clinic for their children were lucky, as they got to receive more information on pregnancy awareness. They were then given gift bags with toiletry items for the baby including baby oil and shampoo. Pregnancy awareness week turned out to be a memorable week for clients.

Women's forum at Pholela CHC is known as "ABANQOBI" which mean conqueror. This is a significant name for our women's forum due to the dedication and hard work they have shown over the few years they have been established. The women's forum has a strong fundamental goal to empower women in the work place and in the community.


On 28 February 2018 the women's forum took it upon themselves to visit a local high school in the area to have an awareness campaign on teenage pregnancy, menstruation cycle and how to take care of yourself as a young women. The school that was identified for this was Ramarobi Secondary School. This initiative was aimed at empowering women to have more knowledge about their bodies, how they can prevent teenage pregnancy and what happens in a women's body when she begins her menstruation cycle.

Sister Zanele (Maternity nurse) explained to the girls about pregnancy and the impact on falling pregnant at a young age/teenage pregnancy. The are many complications that can occur during the pregnancy on the mother or the child since her body may not be strong enough to bear a child. All teenage girls should abstain and know their worth as a female child in the community, concentrate on school work and have a bright future



The students were also taught about the menstrual cycle how it works and what it means when a women begins her periods. The different kind of cycles were explained and different kind of sanitary pads that girls should use.

With all that said and done, it was time to give out sanitary pads to all the young girls, our Social worker (Ms. Ntombenhle) handed out the donations and the girls were very happy to have received such valuable information on this social topic of teenage pregnancy in our community and schools. We certainly hope this will have an impact and the youth will be able to teach others about abstinence.







Pholela CHC staff had an awareness day to commemorate *Child Protection Week* on 19 June 2018. The purpose of this awareness day was to educate the community and clients on the importance of keeping our children safe and protected from all the things that could bring harm to them, either physically or emotionally.

Staff from different departments took the floor to address clients on child protection to unborn children whilst in the womb until they are old enough to be young adults. Sister Manci from maternity informed the clients and community on visiting the maternity ward to have monthly check up visits to ensure that the unborn baby is growing healthy. This is an early stage before the child is even born. Parents need to support each other for the benefit of the child during this stage



The social worker addressed the community on children rights, how we as the public and community do not take into account the importance of children's rights. 'We need to teach our children on their rights and how they should exercise them. Children need to know that they can talk to us if they have been raped or molested by any individual. This is why our children are scared to talk, as we parents, do not teach them of their rights, Said Miss Ntombela

The community was able to relate and understand the importance of children's right and what *Child Protection Week* is all about. The community and clients were given the toll free number for child protection service and informed of the office of our social worker to report any form of child abuse.

COPC Indaba took place on 24 May 2018 at Cedara Agricultural college with the attendance of District Managers, CEO's, Programme Managers, Executive Management community leadership and the honorable MEC for KZN Health Dr S Dhlomo. The department of health aims at reaching out to the core of the problem we face with sickness and disease in the country. The MEC Dr S Dhlomo has asked that each health district in KZN to practice the concept of COPC as this forms part of our duties to have outreach programmes at facility levels. This call by the

MEC is in line with government NHI system which has been piloted in few district hospitals.

"Community Orientated Primary Care is a system which was used by Dr Sydney & Emily Kark when they came to South Africa in the 1940's at Pholela. The concept was aimed at diagnosing the gist of the sickness found in the community and on people, by making personal house visits to families in their homes. "This is the same thing that needs to happen if we want to fight diseases said Dr S Dhlomo"

The same concept is used and proven to be effective in many countries. Dr Gumede a Cuban trained Doctor shared key points on COPC which is highly practiced in Cuba. Prevention is better than cure. This is why we should encompass COPC to prevent disease outbreaks and have control of our health system. The country needs more health care professionals to reach every person that needs medical assistance.

Many facilities who are being piloted for NHI have started to have programmes based on COPC. We also need to have participants from other government stakeholders in order to have the COPC running and productive. The community has to be informed of such developments and know that they also have a role to play to ensure that the COPC programme is effective.

Dialogue sessions were formed by groups to have input ideas on implementing the COPC programme in their district and at facility levels. This COPC Indaba has set the ball rolling for new developments in the health sector.









A day of celebration throughout the health nursing fraternity for international nurses day which is commemorated on 12 May of every year on the health calendar, this is done in memory of the famous Florence Nightingale. A women who is well known during the Crimean War as *The Lady With The Lamp*, helping the sick and wounded in their time of need. Florence introduced the basic fundamentals of nursing and basic patient care.

Traditional healers workshop took place 21 May 2018 at Pholela CHC, to educate our traditional healers on the referral pathway between them and the Dept. of Health. This is because many people still depend on traditional medicines, advise and services from traditional healers. This is very common in most rural areas & in our community at Bulwer.

On this day we had all local traditional healers at Pholela CHC for a mini workshop. Participants were taught about common sickness found in the community that people are living with like TB, Diabetes, asthma, HIV/AIDS and other chronic illness. It is important to know symptoms of the above mentioned illness and how traditional healers can make referrals to the clinics.

Miss Mdladla (Waste Management Officer) explained to the traditional healers about the importance of disposing waste in a correct manner which would be safe for the community as a whole. Traditional medicines can be as dangerous as any medicine, this is why it is important to keep in a safe place away from children to avoid children drinking or swallowing them.

Questions and answer session was opened to the floor. Key points were discussed on matter of the referrals to the clinics. They also raised concern on working closely with CCG's to refer clients to the clinics. Screening for vital signs was also done for all the traditional healers that were in attendance to check on their health status. Refreshments were served and workshop closed
