VARIOUS LOCAL SCHOOLS

Date: 05 October 2022

n October 5th, 2022, Port Shepstone Regional Hospital organized a Career Observation event for students and learners from various schools, including those from KwaZulu-Natal University and Westville Girls High. The purpose of the career observation was to provide information about educational pathways, job opportunities, and available bursaries, recognizing that many learners may not be aware of the diverse possibilities beyond their current knowledge and familial backgrounds. The workshop took place at the hospital's Clinical Education and Training Unit Park Home and was facilitated by Miss N. Nkwanyana from the hospital's HR Department.

Miss Nkwanyana welcomed the students to the Clinical Education and Training Unit Park Home and led various sessions during the career exhibition, creating a valuable teaching and learning opportunity for all participants. Mrs. Sikhosana from the Social Worker department advised learners on the steps to pursue a career in social work, explaining the responsibilities, recommended subjects, and common challenges faced by social workers.

Mr. Jwara from the X-Ray department informed students about the path to becoming a radiographer, emphasizing the need for a bachelor's degree, graduation from medical school, and participation in in-

ternship programs for gaining experience. Mrs. Collocott and Akhona Sikhutshwa (Intern) from the Pharmacy department detailed the educational requirements and duties of pharmacists, emphasizing the importance of passing on medication knowledge to both medical staff and patients.

Dr. Chetty from the Internal Medicine department outlined the qualifications needed to become a doctor and recommended major subjects for students to focus on during their schooling. All presenters stressed the significance of obtaining excellent academic results in high school to qualify for their desired careers.

In her closing remarks, Miss Nkwanyana expressed appreciation to all the speakers for sharing valuable information with the learners. Following the conclusion of the event, she led the learners on a short tour of the hospital wards, during which managers provided insights into ward operations, challenges, and responsibilities. As a gesture of gratitude, the students surprised Miss Nkwanyana with a gift.










In her PowerPoint presentation, the hospital CEO, Ms Bawinile Ndlovu gave an overview of the hospital, highlighting the population that the hospital serves and its dynamics, the referral system in place and the number of beds the hospital manages. Mr Nqobile Radebe, Hospital Finance Manager indicated that the hospital received R732 101 000 for the current financial year and further highlighted how it has been spent so far including the high cost drivers, which include:

- Medication
- Nutrition
- Blood products
- Gloves and disposable sundries
- Sutures
- Surgical supplies
- Implants
- Medical Laboratory tests
- Cleaning services
- Electricity

The Human Resource Manager, Mr Mxolisi Zulu gave an in-depth

After a five-hour robust engagement, which took place in the hospital's Indaba Room, the team visited the following departments: Labour ward, Surgical Female Ward, Paediatric departments, Gynae OPD, Patient Administration, Pharmacy department, Linen Room, Mortuary, Kitchen, Supply Chain department and the plant room to see the newly installed generators.

Both the national and provincial teams were very impressed with the finance management controls of the hospital and commended the senior management and the clinical staff who, in spite of some of the hospital buildings be-

PREMATURITY DAY



Ithough World Prematurity Day is officially observed on 17 November, the Neonatal ICU staff at Port Shepstone Hospital decided to continue raising awareness about prematurity on 23 November 2022. Dr. Azi Ngongoma explained that while a full-term pregnancy typically lasts around forty weeks, premature births, which occur before the 37th week, are the leading cause of death among children under five. He emphasized that the earlier a baby is born, the higher the risk of complications,

with birth weight being a crucial factor as well.

Dr. Ngongoma commended the mothers of premature babies for their perseverance, prayers, and dedication to their infants, and for diligently following clinical advice to reduce the risk of infant mortality.

On this day, Deputy Nursing Manager Mrs. Mandisa Maqutu visited the unit to express her support to the mothers and educate them on various essential care methods for preterm and low birth weight infants. She

praised the mothers for prioritizing their babies and acknowledged the staff's hard work and commitment. Mrs. Maqutu highlighted prolonged skinto-skin contact as a method with extraordinary benefits, including improved temperature regulation, infection prevention, breastmilk let-down, and the facilitation of physiological, behavioral, psychosocial, and neurodevelopmental factors.












PREMATURITY DAY CONT.

While many women cannot entirely avoid preterm births, there are several measures they can take to reduce their risk, including:

- Quitting smoking and avoiding illicit drug use
- Properly managing chronic conditions like diabetes and high blood pressure with appropriate treatment
- Avoiding stressful situations

The hospital's Neonatal unit is enhancing various interventions aimed at reducing child mortality.

HOSPITAL CELEBRATES INTENATIONAL DAY OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES

International Disability Day was held on December 3, 2022. This day is observed with an aim of promoting awareness and understanding of those with disabilities and to encourage collaboration around protecting the human dignity, rights, and quality of life for those with disabilities. The theme for this year's International Disability Day was "Transformative solutions for inclusive development: the role of innovation in fueling an accessible and equitable world". Miss Kirsten Smith (Community Service Officer), said as occupational therapists, one of the core values upon which our profession is constructed is understanding disability with the aim of providing care and services to improve both the quality of life of an individual and their ability to engage meaningfully in their own environment and in occupations, which are important to them.

Hence, with International Disability Day in mind, the department planned a home visit on 22 December 2022 to issue two motorized wheelchairs to two patients who would benefit hugely from them. The patients and their family members received training from both the occupational therapist and wheelchair repairer with regard to how to operate these wheelchairs and maintain them. The motorized wheelchairs were issued with the intention of providing both individuals safe accessibility to their various environments (i.e.: school, community, and home) through acting as a 'bridge' in overcoming mobility hindrances. When an individual's environment is more accessible, and they are able to move efficiently and safely around their environment, they are able to engage in activities, which are meaningful to them.

Miss Ngabisile Lushaba mother of Wendy Lushaba said she will not forget this day because she was a laughing stock in the community. Her daughter will now have access to various community activities. She further appreciated the support they received from Mr Ncungama (Principal of Maris Stella primary school). The mother of Lusanda Ngcobo (Miss Zibuyile Ngcobo) was very happy to the extent that she could not hold her tears because of excitement. She was very happy to see her boy on a motorized wheelchair. Lusanda said this wheelchair would change his life for the better. He will now be able to go to the shops by himself. He further said it was very hard before because he had to wait for his friends to come back from school so they can assist him. His mother said Lusanda currently is not registered to any school because schools are far away from where they live and considering Lusanda's situation it will be impossible for him to attend any school.

It is our hope that these motorized wheelchairs will play a role in providing these individuals with more accessibility to their environments and more opportunity to engage in their communities, with the goal of creating a more 'accessible and equitable' world, said Miss Smith.
