We are proud to report that our hospital is now one of 25 health facilities, which are baby friendly in KZN. This means that we promote breast-feeding and love babies. We were assessed on 2 & 3 September 2003, and passed on our first attempt. You can see our awards hanging proudly in the maternity ward. Kangaroo keep their young close to their body in a pouch; similarly, Kangaroo Mother Care promotes the skin-to-skin care of the baby. The more often your baby is closer to your body; a stronger mother to child bond develops. This maternal bond is important for the development of the child. The Kangaroo Mother Care Programme forms part of the Baby friendly initiative and is now running successfully. Our well - established

Breast-Feeding Programme passed with flying colors on its first assessment. We are now on a baby friendly Hospital and promise to maintain the standard. Colostrum is the first milk in the breast from the 1st to the 4th day after delivery. It contains important nutrients and anti bodies from the mother, which help in the development of the baby's immune system. So all your mums out there keep your newborn babies close to you, and remember breast milk is the best milk.

TRAUMA / CRISIS CENTRE

St Andrews Hospital has opened a crisis center, in December 2003 next to the T.B office. The center is open from 7:00 to 16:00 Monday to Friday and there are counselors available 24hours.

It deals with both patients and staff that have been subjected to any form of abuse such as rape, suicide or domestic violence. They also help those with psychosocial problems such as: stress, depression, and H.I.V/AIDS related problems.

The office promotes the welfare of people within the hospital setting, so everyone is welcome. They adopt an open door policy, which means that no one is turned away.

Social worker- Ms Y.Z Dlulane, and Forensic Nurse-Sister N.C Mchunu are qualified trauma counselors at the center, and will be visiting schools and churches to inform the public on the services available.

St. Andrew's Hospital Board



<u>Farewell to out going</u> chairman, Mr. Mathee

Currently the membership of the Hospital Board comprises of nominated members from the community who have been accepted by the Provincial Minister of Health. The Medical Superintendent of the Hospital shall be a member of the Board. The Nursing Service Manager is invited to attend the Board meetings but is not a member. The hospital provides the secretarial services to the Board.

The Board is obliged to hold quarterly meetings. The chairman of the Board has the right to call a special meeting of the Board at any time. One of the main functions of the board members is form a link between the community served by the hospital and the hospital staff. It is the Board's responsibility to channel communication between the hospital management and the local community and to liaise with other organizations with a view to assisting patients and staff in areas of special need. In order to achieve this, the Board Members need to become acquainted with the operation of the hospital. Other functions for the Board Members which may include the establishment and administration of a Board Fund, general matters concerning the conduct and management of the hospital, consider and make recommendations in respect of any complaints received and ensure that the matters deliberated at the meetings shall be treated as confidential.

The St Andrews Hospital Board was established in 1985/6 after the hospital was handed over to the Natal Provincial Administration in 1984. During this period it has campaigned on several issues including the provision of an ambulance service, a ramp to the top floor and the upgrading of ablution facilities in the male ward, the appointment of additional staff, the Board having paid additional staff for several years, the up grading of the hospital with TV's for the patients, the intercom system and m-net in the nurse's home. At one time the Board sponsored a paging system for the medical officers. Financial contributions to the upgrading of official accommodation and the provision of a visitor's shelter were also some of the projects undertaken by the Board. The hospital board has always assisted with the provision of Christmas Cheer to the patients. There will be changes to the constitution of the Hospital Board in the future. This will be determined in terms of the New Health Act.
