embers of the KwaZulu-Natal Legislature conducted their oversight visit in Umkhanyakude District in September 2025. The health functionality monitoring programme commenced on Tuesday, 2 September 2025, at Manguzi Hospital, and continued to Mseleni Hospital. The visit placed a special focus on various aspects of Emergency Medical Services (EMS).

On the final day, the delegation received comprehensive briefings from health institutions and conducted a tour of the Umkhanyakude District EMS offices. The purpose was to assess working conditions, identify operational challenges, and develop recommendations for improving emergency services for the citizens of Umkhanyakude.

The delegation was led by the Chairperson of the Quality of Life Committee, Honourable Fikile Masiko. Other honourable members in attendance included Honourable Dudu Nzama, Honourable Thuthukani Madondo, and Honourable Nkosinathi Mthethwa.

male staff members was held.
The event featured a range of
informative presentations
addressing key issues affecting
men's lives and wellbeing.

Mr. Sipho Msane delivered a thought-provoking talk on financial literacy, encouraging men to take proactive steps in managing their finances wisely. His presentation aimed to raise awareness and reshape attitudes towards financial responsibility.

Mr. Xulu, representing the Department of Agriculture and Land Reform, outlined various government programmes available to individuals aspiring to venture into agriculture. His presentation was particularly valuable in highlighting opportunities for economic empowerment through land and farming initiatives.

Health matters took centre stage as Sir Sikhosana urged men to prioritise their health by regularly checking their health status. He stressed the importance of early detection and intervention to prevent health deterioration.

Mr. Madela from the South African Police Service (SAPS) addressed issues related to gender-based violence (GBV). He warned about behaviours and situations that, if left unaddressed, could escalate into legal trouble, urging men to act responsibly and with awareness.

Equally compelling was the session by Mr. Gumede, a social worker from Bethesda Hospital, who focused on mental health. He emphasised the importance of emotional wellbeing and encouraged men to seek help and prioritise self-care.

productive space for dialogue, reflection, and peer learning. District Director Mr. B.P. Fakude commended the initiative, praising the organisers and attendees for prioritising such a vital conversation. He noted that sessions like these play a significant role in instilling values, promoting personal growth, and strengthening unity among men in the workplace.


