WENTWORTH BUDGET REVIEW AND COST SAVING MEASURES.

The management of Wentworth hospital held a much anticipated budget review and cost saving implementation which was presented by Dr. S. B. Kader (hospital manager). The main emphasis of this presentation was to keep employees informed about what really goes on in the institution and how the budget is used for effective service delivery. The hospital realizes that change can be only achieved if ideas are shared and communication is improved between staff and management.

There were also groundbreaking initiatives taken when it came to cost saving measures and the general smooth running of the institution. These included the referral system / catchment area, compensation of employees, medical services, pharmacy, x-ray, bloods and goods and services. The following is an elaboration of a few:

MEDICAL SERVICES

- De-commission number of beds
- Consolidate wards
- Rationalize utilization of beds
- Create a step-down facility (using present staff)
- No commissioning of new services or expansion of new services (e.g. Maternity)
- A & E minor theatre continues

GOODS AND SERVICES

- Strict adherence to cash flow policies
- Review all stock levels
- Carrying 1 month stock levels only
- Review stoma services
- Review and prioritize maintenance plan

COMPENSATION OF EMPLOYEES

- Redeploy staff to areas of need
- Review overtime payments
- Review all workshops to be attended
- No conferences to be attended

With these guidelines the hospital will benefit while effective and efficient service delivery will not be compromised.

GARDEN PROJECT NEWS

The Wentworth Hospital garden is already bearing the fruits of the hard work that

has been put in by the staff. The idea to have such a project was conceptualized two to three years ago. In an interview with the project manager, Dr. Ramdeen, the

medical manager she stated that they got a lot of support from the District office where they were given garden equipments like rakes and one lay counselor was also trained.

One huge problem though that the hospital has is the monkey invasion problem, thus a reluctancy in starting the project. Attempts were made for funding and Engene (the oil refinery) came to the rescue in an attempt to alleviate poverty.

The company constructed a steel framework and further employed an NGO called Environment and Language Educational Trust (ELET) to manage the project and to further provide agricultural education for both the patients and staff.

The garden has been in operation since May 2008 and has already had garden sales like spinach, lettuce ect. Plans are in the pipeline to have seedlings and indigenous plants to be sold at the nursery and for the official opening of the garden which might take place in October. Patients are also encouraged to be involve with the garden for skills development.

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HEPATITIS C CAMPAIGN

In an effort to educate and inform patients on Hepatitis, the health promotion department held a talk on the disease in the out patient department. Hepatitis is the inflammation of the liver which could be caused by a range of chemicals and toxins such as alcohol or drugs.

Prevention is better than cure thus general guidelines on the prevention of

hepatitis were outlined as follows:

- People with viral hepatitis should Practice safe sex or abstain.
- Avoid contact with blood
- Avoid drug use. Don't share needles.
- Hepatitis A and E patients should not prepare food for others.

Symptoms of the disease are usually mild, especially in children. They generally appear between 2 to 6 weeks after exposure to the virus. Adult patients though are more likely to have fever, jaundice and itching that can last to several months.
