SPOTLIGHT ON REHABILITATION DEPARTMENT



Appelsbosch Hospital is fortunate to have a very much dedicated rehabilitation Department which consists of Occupation Therapist and physiotherapist. The success of this team is through the dedication and team work of all components involved. When people ever thing that comes to mind is "ukujima" meaning exercise. Although it form an essential component but this highly not the true definition of the quality and type of service they offer

The main objective of physiotherapy and occupational therapy combined of a rehabilitation service when are.....for the patient with medical, **post signal**, **post**

trauma, neurological, orthopedic, musculo-skeletal and other conditions. This include for example burns, head injures, strokes, trauma, hand injuries, amputation, respiratory, cardiac and other disorders. The roles of physiotherapist and occupational therapist differ oven through they work together. Occupation therapy is a medical profession which help to train individuals often illness to live more independent lives. Occupation therapy use carefully selected activities and social area.

Physiotherapy is the scientific use of movement techniques improve healing and function, especially when it is treated by ageing, injury, disability or disease. Physiotherapists are involved in health promotion, injury prevention, treatment and rehabilitation.

In keeping up with a high quality of service standards offered we additionally run groups on awareness and management of various chronic conditions (osteoarthritis, cerebral palsy etc). Although our rehabilitations team is under-staffed and within financial constraints this year we still strive to offer the best services we can.



"EAST MEETS WEST"

Health Outreach Promotion & Empowerment (HOPE) is the programme started by Dr N. Narainswami. The objective for this programme is to better equip local traditional healers to assess and refer patients to the clinics and hospital timeously as well as to bridge the gaps in continuity of care evident in Appelsbosch current health system. It is also aim to train traditional healers on epidemiology of HIV/AIDS and TB in South Africa, methods of spread of disease, complications of diabetes, diagnosis of diabetes, Hypertension, HIV, AIDS and aspect of treatment.

This is an ongoing programme as it is held monthly at Efaye Tribal Court. There will be follow up workshops for the rest of the year and traditional healers will receive certificate

upon completion.
