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TB BLITZ HELD BY CBH

After a follow-up TB meeting held on 26 February 2007, it was decided that CBH would conduct a TB Blitz in the rural settlement in Gingindlovu. Due the visit by the MEC, it was decided that the Blitz would be postponed to May 2007

UMBIKO

The successful outreach activity was held over three days by a team consisting of 16 people, and co-ordinated by Sr. Shange, Dr. L. Naidoo and Dr. Thandrayen.

On Wednesday, 30 May 2007, the 16 members ventured out into the Gingindlovu informal settlement (about 150 households) at about 09h45. One kombi was used to transport most of the staff, and the Mobile Clinic van was used to carry some equipment and staff. An Isuzu double cab was used to transport collected sputum specimens from the site to CBH laboratory at 12h30, 15h15 and 17h45.

The residences were visited by 4 teams (2 consisting of 2

people and 2 consisting of 3 people). Each team consisted of one/two Professional Nurse/s and one/two Staff Nurse/s. They visited the residents and counselled them on TB, educated them on the symptoms of TB, recommended VCT, and collected the first specimens from TB suspects. Sputum containers were left with the suspects for a second specimen, which was collected from the site the next morning (Thursday).

While this was going on, two HIV/VCT lay counsellors and two clerks remained at a central point with the vehicles to do VCT, fill in the TB suspect registers, and collect the incoming specimens, which were transported to CBH laboratory.

The team managed to cover a huge population in the settlement, and many people were counselled and tested for HIV. Ill suspects and children were also referred to Gingind-lovu Clinic and to hospital.

Team members were served

with lunch packs, and TB suspects who turned out to be cases would collect food parcels from Gingindlovu Clinic on Friday, 01 June 2007.

Laboratory staff at CBH worked extra during the blitz to ensure the AFB microscopy results were ready by 01 June 2007. A team was despatched then to locate the sputum-positive patients and bring them to CBH for counselling and TB treatment.

The endeavour turned out to be a huge success, and contributed tremendously to CBH's recognition for excellent outreach services.

CBH staff plan to conduct further blitz activities and outreach programmes for HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Infections and Diseases, and other Primary Health Care programmes, including rehabilitation and support services.
