FIGHTING DISEASE, FIGHTING POVERTY, GIVING HOPE



The Minister of Health, Dr Zweli Mkhize, accompanied by the KZN MEC for Health, Ms Nomagugu Simelane-Zulu visited Ubuhlebezwe sub-district for an NHI roadshow. The aim of the roadshow was so that the honourable Minister could get to provide the members of the public with facts pertaining to the proposals of the NHI bill. Since the start of the consultation process with regards to the NHI bill; a lot has been said, both in support and chastisement of the bill.

A plethora of interest groups have also made their submissions regarding the bill. In the process of making those submissions, some misinformation has been proliferated in public. It is credence to the above that the honourable Minister decided to embark on these roadshows with an aim of dispelling NHI urban legends spread by doomsayers.

The Minister and MEC started by visiting Christ The King Hospital, to get a feel of the progress made and challenges confronted by those at the coalface of service delivery. The Minister and MEC arrived at Christ The King ac-

companied by Mayors, Speakers, councilors and a number of other dignitaries. They were welcomed by the CTK Hospital Board, Harry Gwala District Director, Mrs. GLL Zuma, Christ The King CEO, Mrs. SW Maseko, CEOs from neighboring hospitals and the rest of the CTK management team.

During the briefing session, Mrs. Maseko did a presentation covering the profile of the sub-district, NHI programmes and Challenges threatening progress. The chairperson of the board also made a submission in support of the presentation, particularly regarding shortage of staff. After the briefing, the leadership took rounds to Outpatients, Filing room and Maternity ward. The Minister and MEC also interacted with the patients.

From Christ The King, the entourage proceeded to Morningside Sports Field to engage the community. In her speech, the MEC spoke about her department's plans to improve service delivery. Her speech focused mainly on reducing the number of vacant posts across the board and reduction of waiting times in hos-

pitals and clinics. She further committed on upgrading one of the district hospitals in Harry Gwala to a regional hospital, with the aim of expediting patients' access to specialized health services.

Addressing the community, the minister acknowledged challenges that are still bedeviling public health system, such as aging infrastructure, availability of medicine and shortage of staff. He said implementation of NHI will resolve the phenomenon of commodification of health care caused by the status core of a fragmented health system. The minister dispelled the notion that the country will not afford NHI, he said the current national fiscus will be enough to finance the implementation of NHI. In response to the minister's presentation, community members were in unison in their overwhelming support for NHI and said they could not wait for its actual implementation.

It is often said that there is no substitution for the nourishing and natural breast milk.

Over the years, due to the fact that modern women are also economically active; breastfeeding was kind of sidestepped by formula feeding.

Despite the above, breastfeeding remains the single most effective intervention in the prevention child mortality and morbidity. What is even better about breast milk is that it is free-of-charge and readily available to

mothers. Credence to the above, South African Government, particularly the Department of Health was prompted to introduce programmes and campaigns aimed at raising awareness on the advantages of breastfeeding.

CTK is an accredited Mother, Baby Friendly Hospital Initiative status holder. The status was awarded in 2012. This simply means that the institution has created a conducive environment for mothers to breastfeed and continuously strive to create awareness on the importance

of breastfeeding. The above should also extend to communities throughout the sub-district through Code workshops, talks and campaigns.

This year, 2020 CTK Breastfeeding committee was, as it always does, on a campaign trail to create awareness on breastfeeding. Apart from ongoing programmes that are in place to promote and maintain breastfeeding culture, members of the committee visited SASSA service centers and taxi ranks to have direct engagements with communities about the

Tuberculosis remains among the top ten killer diseases worldwide. Alike, South Africa is one of the countries highest TB prevalence. Moreover KwaZulu-Natal is among the top 3 South African provinces in terms of TB burden. TB is the number one killer disease in the country. People with compromised immune systems are more susceptible to contracting TB. The good thing about it is that TB is curable.

Though the pandemic is curable, the easiest and

cheapest approach would prevention rather than cure. It is for that reason that the month of March is dedicated as a TB awareness month by World Health Organization. Even though TB awareness forms part of topics covered during daily health education and apart from the fact that TB awareness posters are a prominent feature on walls of the hospital and clinics, more deliberate programmes would be organized every year during the month of March. This year, the message taken

to the communities through Operation Mbo outreach programme. The outreach was rolled to mostly remote and far-flung areas within Ubuhlebezwe sub-district. Since the focus was on outpatients, OPD was not to be spared. A team of dedicated nurses lead by Sr Mazinyo visited OPD on the 27th of April 2019 to spread the message on how to prevent TB and to identify symptoms for early treatment.

for all citizens" the Minister has committed among other things to ensuring the "strengthening Health System Effectiveness".

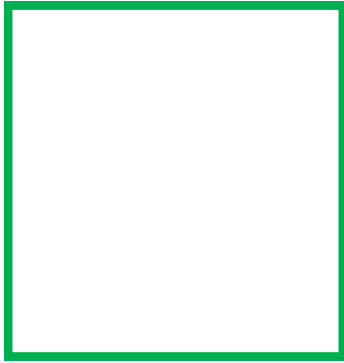

These three streams are ward-based PHC outreach teams, school health teams and district-based specialists. The entire aim of the programme is to encourage preventative approach to health care.

In a nutshell, the above represents a clarion call to all the health care workers to go out of the comfort zone and

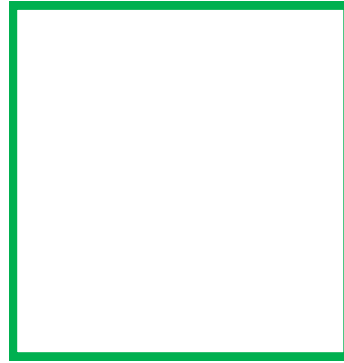

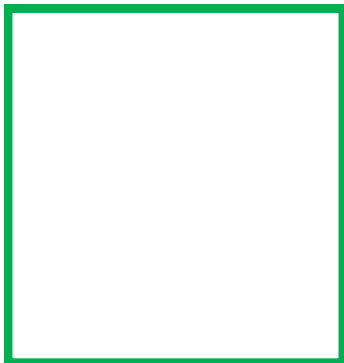
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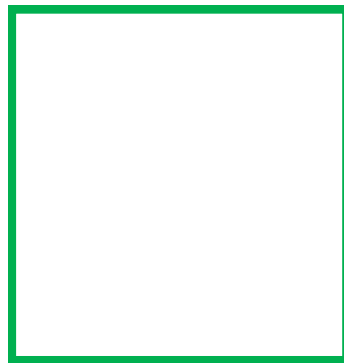
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
