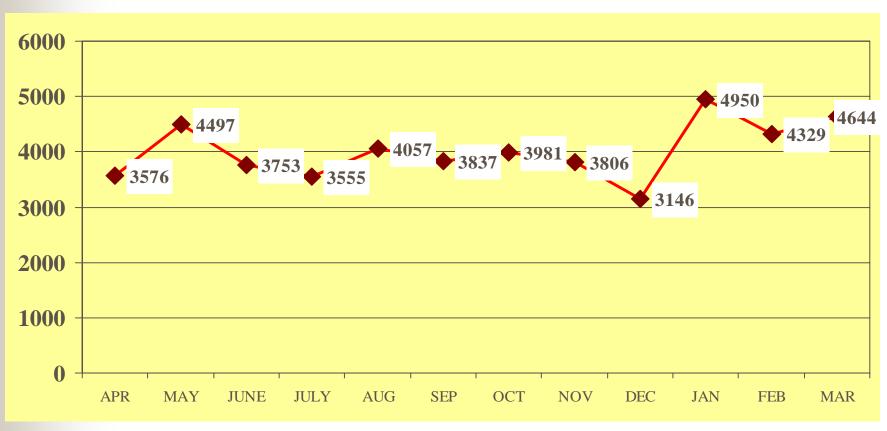

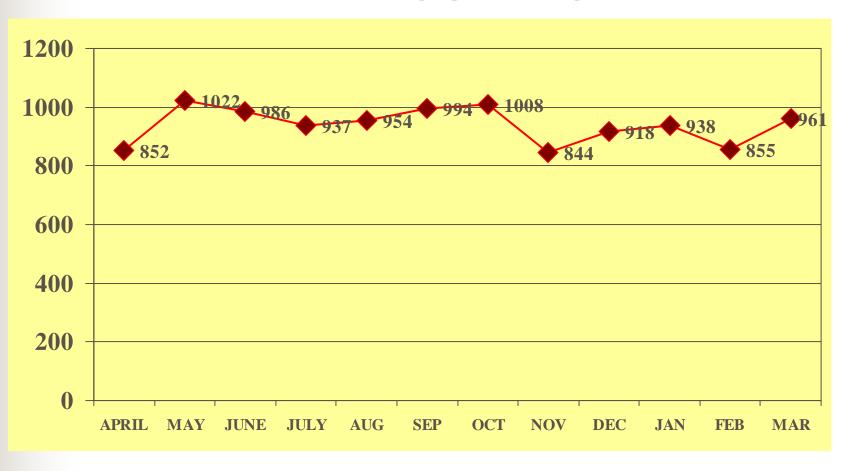

TOTAL OPD HEADCOUNT



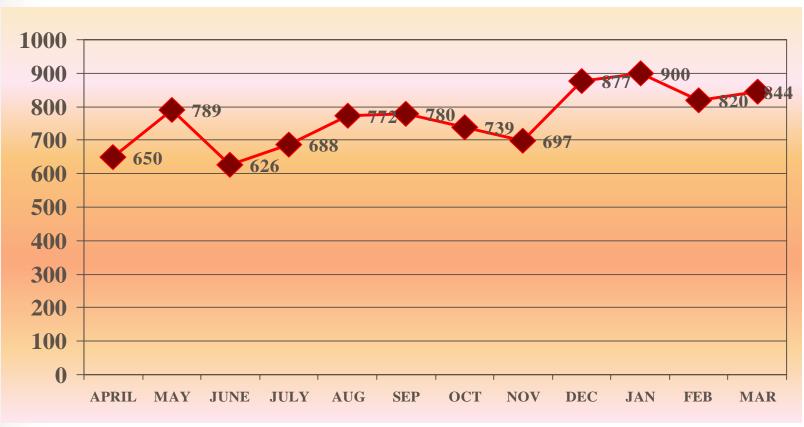
The total number of patients attending general OPD and specialized outpatients Clinic

ADMISSIONS



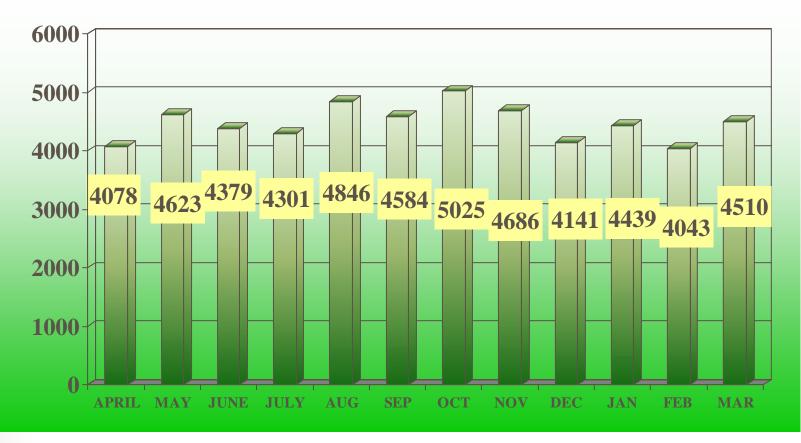
The number of new patient admission to the ward during the reporting period

CASUALTY HEADCOUNT



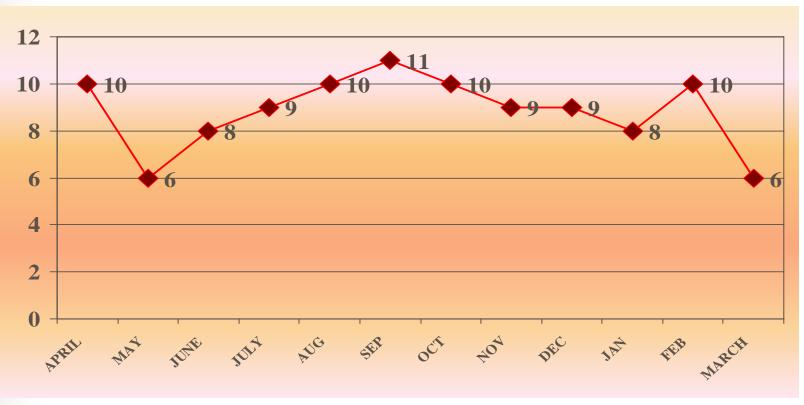
The number of patients attending casualty requiring emergency treatment during reporting period

INPATIENT DAYS



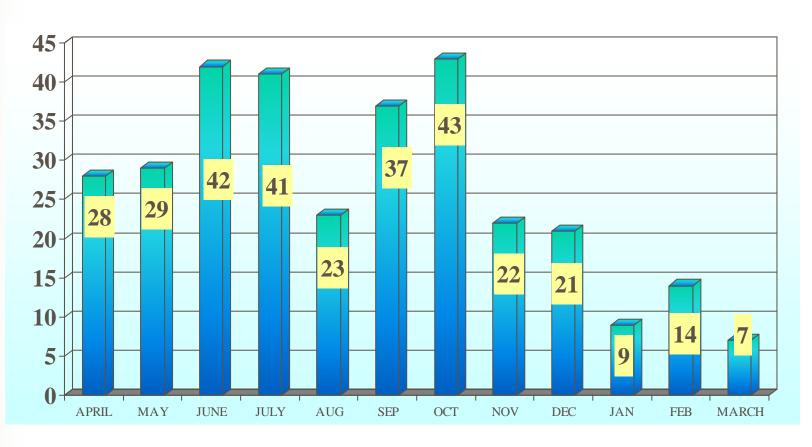
The number of patients that stay overnight in the ward

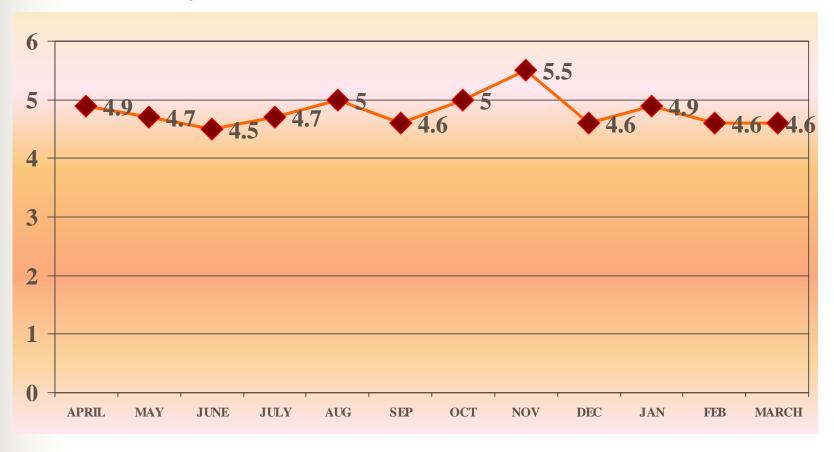


BED OCCUPANCY RATE

AVERAGE LENGTH OF STAY



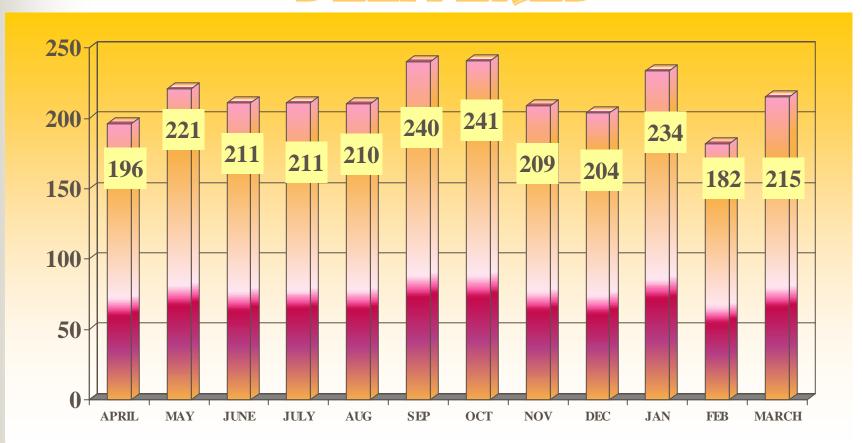
Average number of days that an admitted patient spends in the hospital before discharge or death

STILL BIRTH RATE

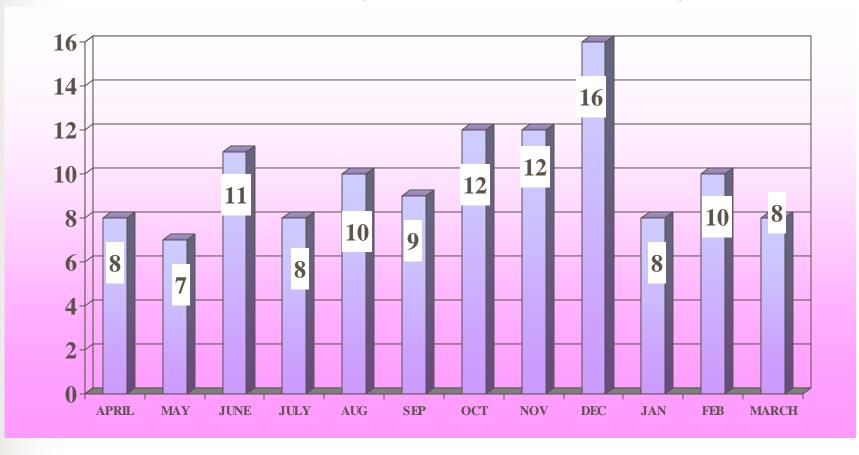


Percentage of stillbirths in relation to the total number of deliveries

NUMBER OF WOMEN DELIVERED

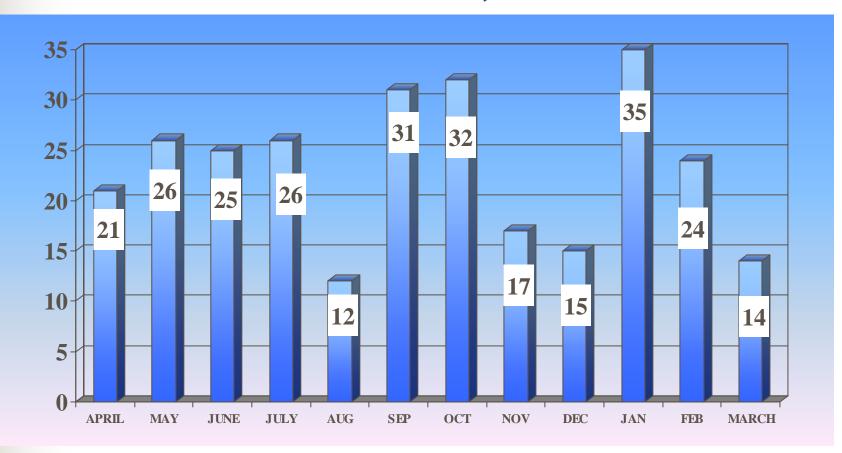


TEENAGE PREGNANCY RATE

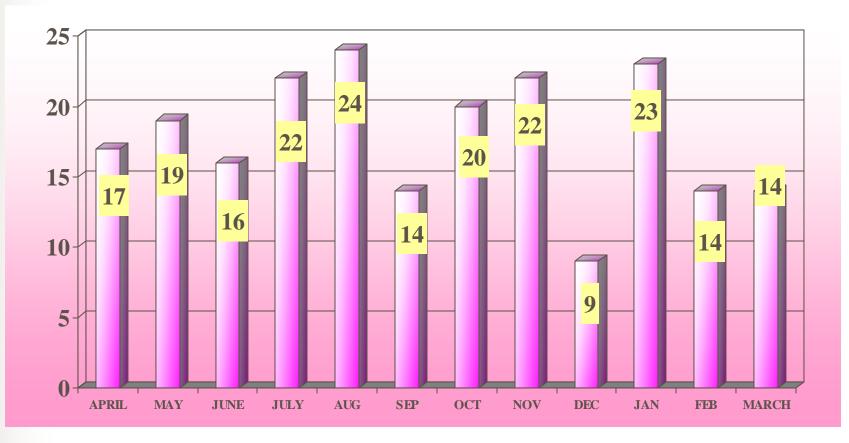


% of women under 18 yrs who delivered at the facility in relation to the total number of deliveries

WOMEN MORE THAN 34 YEARS DELIVERED

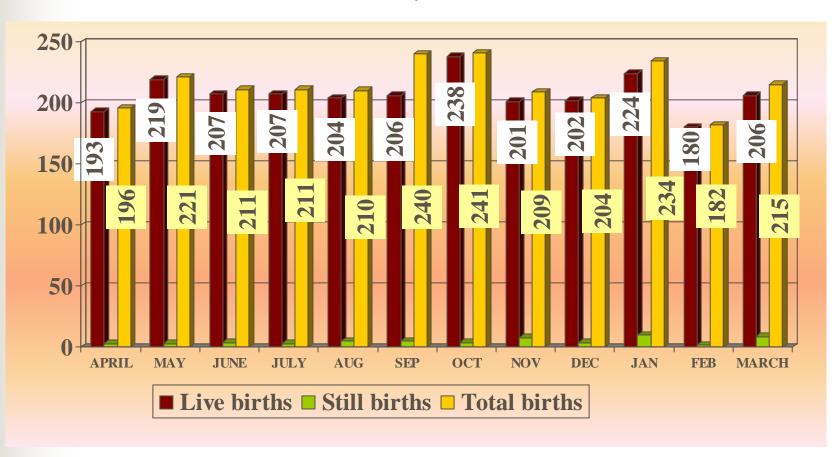


CAESAREAN SECTION RATE

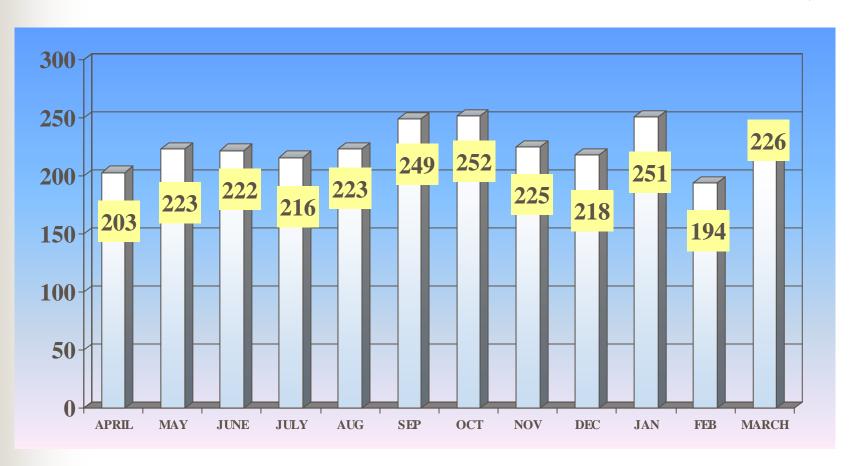


Number of caesarean section deliveries expressed as a percentage of total deliveries

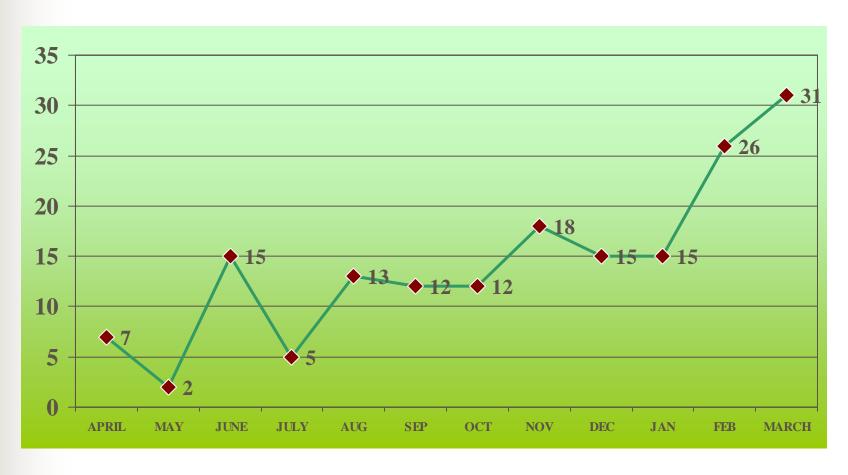

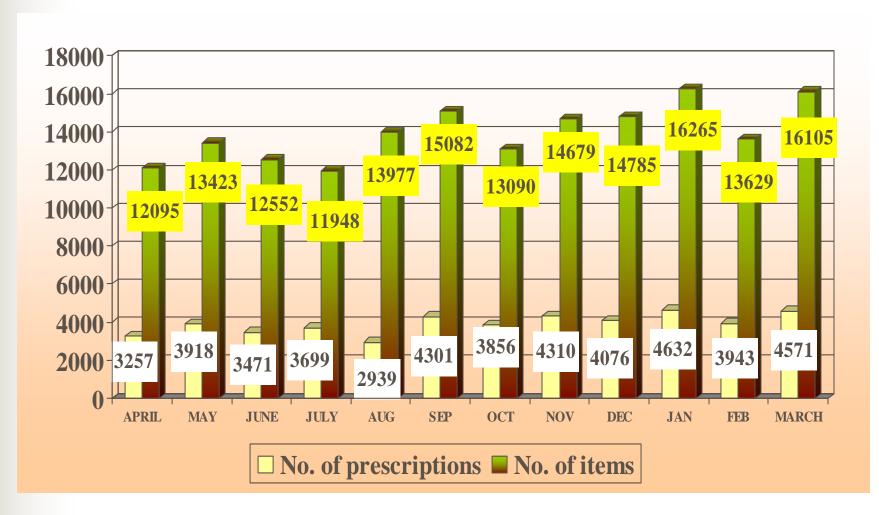

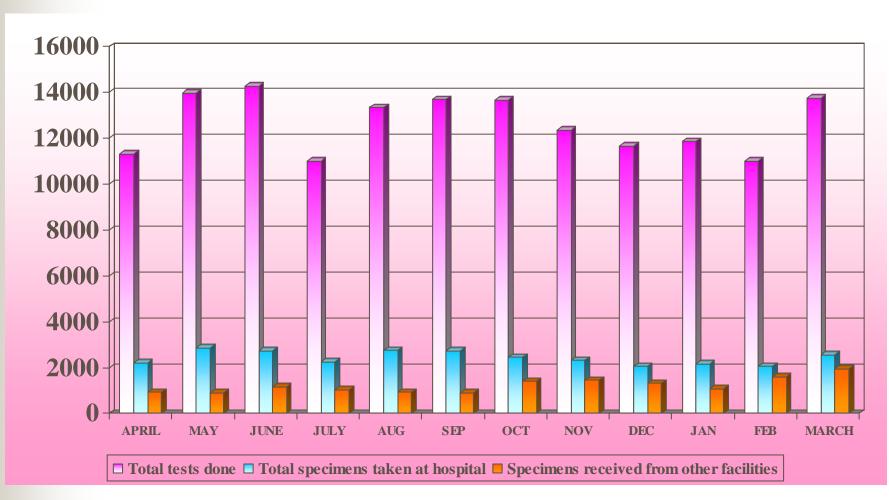

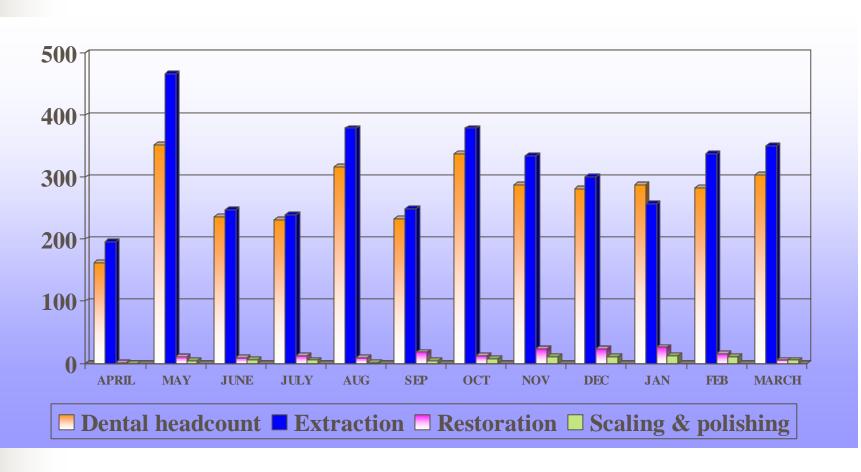

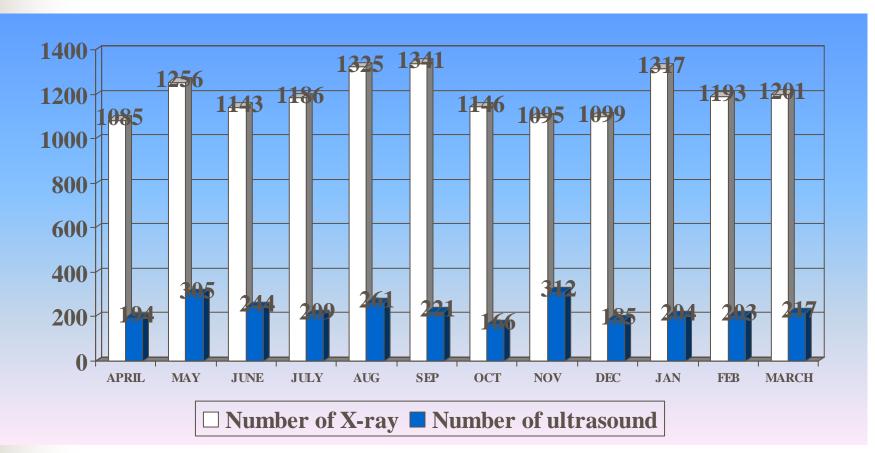

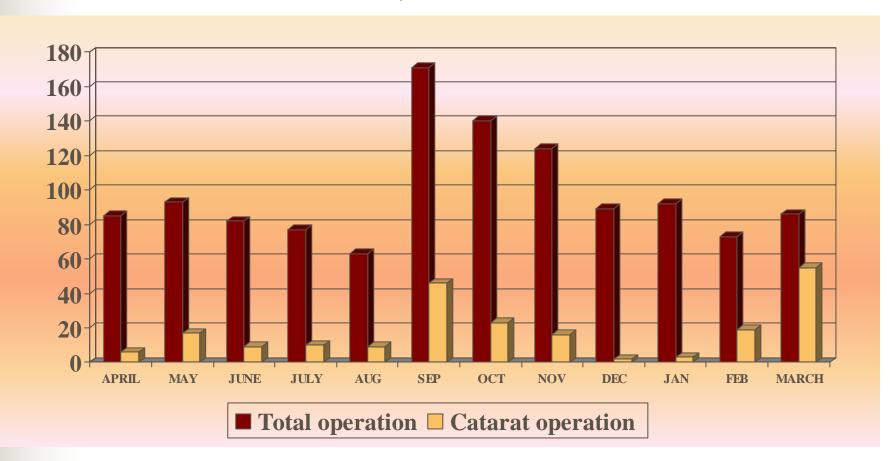

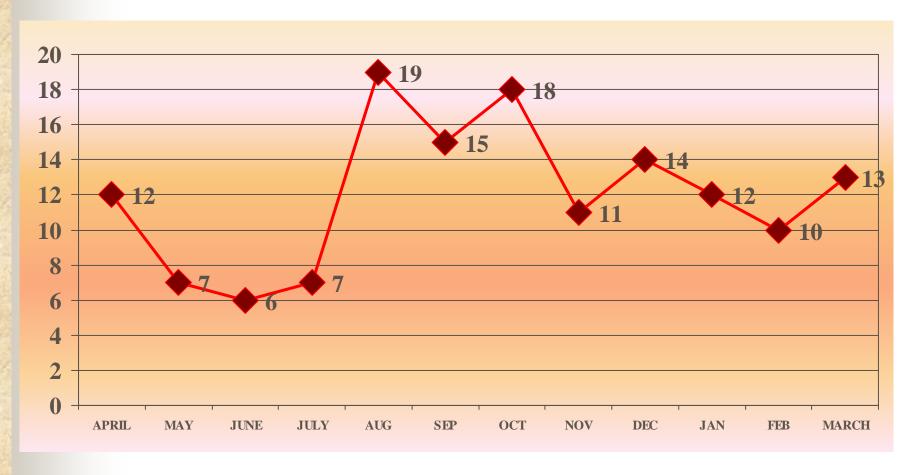
