Pap smears screening education for patients was held on 29th August 2024. This taught how to detect early signs of **cervical cancer** or **precancerous changes** before they become more serious. Early detection allows for:


- Treatment of precancerous cells before they develop into cancer.
- Better **outcomes** for women diagnosed with cervical cancer.
- Prevention of cervical cancer through identification and treatment of abnormal cell changes.

Recommendations

- Start getting Pap smears at age 21
- Get a Pap smear every 3 years until age 21.
- Get a Pap smear and HPV (Human Papillomavirus) test every 5 years from the age of 30








ORAL HEALTH 09/2024 T010/2024




WOMENS' DAY CELEBRATION

Ayanda Ngubane managed the flow of the event and ensured all segments were covered. Sr. Kaula led the prayer, setting a positive and respectful tone for the proceedings. Sr. Ntontele explained the goals of the event, welcoming participants and setting the stage for the day's discussions on pregnancy and maternal health.

Ayanda Shezi discussed the importance of healthy and responsible conception practices, including family planning methods, timing, and conditions for optimal maternal and fetal health. Health promoter Happy highlighted the benefits of breastfeeding, its importance for infant health, and provided guidance on best practices to ensure mothers feel empowered to breastfeed successfully. Sr. NE Mkhize explained the role and importance of antenatal care, helping expectant mothers understand why regular check-ups, screenings, and care are essential for a healthy pregnancy. Sr. B Gebashe provided crucial information about the stages of labor and delivery, educating attendees on what to expect, pain management, and the importance of proper medical support during childbirth. Sr. Dzanibe concluded the event by offering gratitude to everyone involved, ensured the community felt appreciated for their participation and commitment to maternal health.















T.B EVENT 25/03/2025



Tuberculosis (T.B.) is a contagious bacterial infection primarily affecting the lungs, caused by Mycobacterium tuberculosis. There are two types: Latent T.B., where the bacteria are inactive and non-infectious, and Active T.B., which is symptomatic and can spread to others. The standard medication regimen for T.B. includes a combination of drugs like Isoniazid, Rifampic-in, Pyrazinamide, and Ethambutol, typically for 6-9 months. Preventing T.B. involves measures such as vaccination (BCG), good hygiene practices, wearing masks, and ensuring proper ventilation to minimize airborne transmission. Tracing contacts helps identify individuals at risk, enabling early detection and reducing further spread. Home visits are essential for supporting patient adherence to treatment, monitoring health, and educating families. This year's outreach programme focused on children aged 5-10 years, with school visits to promote awareness. Events at Pediatrics (March 25, 2025) and Hast (March 26, 2025) emphasized the importance of hygiene in controlling T.B. spread.
