The massage was successfully related to the community about dangers of cigarette smoking. It was also emphasized that cigarette smoking does not only cripple your health but it also cripples your pocket.



Cervical Screening

It is taking of the cervical smear for cytological examination to detect the presence of the cervical infraepithelial neoplasta (C.I.N.).

Cervical screening is important to be done so as to detect cervical cancer at the earliest stage as possible so as to provide treatment early to prevent women from cervical cancer which can be cured.

First it is important that you give information to the women about cervical screening, why it is done, and what benefit it is to her to have pap smear done.

Give advice about the procedure itself as some women belief that cervical screening is a very painful procedure. You also inform the women about the stages of cervical cancer and the importance of early diagnosis as undiagnosed cervical cancer can disseminate to the other organs of blood which can be very difficult to treat.

Dong cervical screening can also help in diagnosing and treatment of other infections like sexual transmitted infection which can be diagnosed during the procedure.

KHANYA AFRIKA members were at East Boom CHC on Saturday so as to give opportunity to the women who are unable to come to clinic during weekdays to have cervical screening done and to help them benefit from to the Philama project which is accessible to all women. Aim of Philama is to prevent women dying from cancer of the cervix.

- Client were encouraged to have HI V testing after there have done pap smear.

YOUTH DAY

hat is the youth day mean to us?

It is where we remember those who were died for fighting against abuse/ fighting for our rights as we are the black people.

It is a day violently etched on the South African collective conscience. Commemorated over 30 years later as Youth Day, an official holiday, it is the day that honours the deaths of hundreds of Soweto schoolchildren, a day that changed the course of the country's history:16 June 1976.

On that day the government and the police were caught off guard, when the simmering bubble of anger of schoolchildren finally burst, releasing an intensity of emotion that the police controlled in the only manner they knew how: with ruthless aggression. South African History online puts the number of dead at 200, far higher than the official figure of 23.

16 UNE 1976

It was cold and overcast as pupils gathered at schools across Soweto on 16 June. At an agreed time, they set off for Orlando West Secondary School In *Vilakazi* Street, with thousands streaming in from all directions. The planned to march from the school

to the Orlando Stadium.
'By 13.30am, over 5 000 students had gathered on *Vilakazi* Street and more were arriving every minute," say Bonner and Segal. In total over 15 000 *uniformed* students between the ages of 10 and 20[were] marching that day.

Once at the stadium, the plan was to agree on a list of grievances, and then possibly to march to the offices of the Transvaal department of education In *Booysens*, in Johannesburg's southern suburbs.

But this didn't happen,
Police formed a wall facing the pupil, warning
them to disperse— an
order met with resistance. Teargas was fired
into the crowd and police dogs release. In the
chaos, children ran back
and forth, throwing
stones at the police—
who fired more teargas.

Bonner and Segal puote a student leading the march, Jon-Jon Mkhonza: 'Students were scattered, running up and down......coming back. It was some kind of game because they were running away, coming back, taking stones, throwing them at the police....it was chaos.

Whenever the police shot teargas, we jumped the wall to the churchyard and then came back and started discussing again.

THE FIRST SHOT

Came the first shot straight into the crowd, without warning. Other policemen took up the signal and more shots were fired. Twelve-year-old Hector Pieterson fell to the ground, fatally wounded. He was picked up by <u>Mbuy-isa Makhubo</u>, a fellow student, who ran with him towards the Phefeni Clinic, with <u>Pieterson's</u> crying sister Antoinette running alongside.

The World photographer Sam Nzima was there to record <u>Pieterson's</u> last moments. 'I saw a child fall down,' he says. 'Under a shower of bullets I rushed forward and went for the picture.'

The photo went around the world and <u>Pieterson</u> came to symbolize the uprising, giving the world an in-your face view of the brutality of <u>apartheld</u>.

Then all hell broke loose. Students targeted <u>apartheig</u> symbols: administrative offices, government buses and vehicles and municipal beer halls, which were first looted and then set alight. By the end of he day thick clouds of black smoke hung over the township,

and the streets were littered with upturned vehicles, stones and rocks.

Anti-riot vehicles poured into Soweto, roadblocks were erected at all entrances, the army was placed on alert and <u>hell-copters</u> hovered overhead, <u>droping</u> teargas canisters and shooting.

The Injured pupils were taken to Chris Hanl <u>Baragwanath</u> Hospital, some dying in its corridors, some dying at its gates before they could be admitted, according to Bonner and Segal.

As night fell, the unlit township became even more terrifying: blinded by the night, police simply fired into the blackness. The students return the fire with their own weapons: bottles and stones. The looted liquor was taking effect—people wandered the streets intoxicated, in a celebrator mood, raising clenched fists and shouting 'Amandla!'(power)

SERVICES OFFERED:

- Providing information about alcohol and drugs to the general public.
- Assessment to determine drug USE, ABUSE OR DEPENDENCE.
- Counseling for alcoholics and drug addicts.
- Medical help—detoxification, supply of antabuse, etc.
- Advice and counseling to the family, even if the alcoholic/drug dependent will not stop drinking / drugging.

- Group for:
 - -drug abusers
 - -alcoholics
 - -wives of alcoholics
 - -children of alcoholics
 - -parents of drug addicts
- Assessment of and education session for young people who are.
- Advice to parents if they suspect that their child is drugging.
- Drug testing
- Education and preventative programmes.
- Advice to families and committal to rehabilitation centres for out of control or unmotivated clients.

DRUG ABUSE,

It is important to look for an overall pattern which includes more than just one or two signs before you can be reasonably sure your child is on drugs.

rugs have the power both to improve and to damage health, depending on the type of drugs used, the quantity consumed and the purpose for which they are taken. For example, while morphine can relieve pain, heroin can be highly addictive. Such example illustrate need to control drugs.

rugs under international control include amphetamine-type

stimulants, cannabis, coca/cocaine, hallucinogens, opiates and hypnotic sedatives, all of which have immediate physical effects. While some of the physical effects might sound pleasant, they do not last long. Drugs can also severely hinder psychological and emotional development, particularly in young people. In addition, some users risk addiction.

For those who dependent on drugs, there is hope. Treatment and recovery are possible starting from the most problematic conditions. Drug dependence is a treatable disease, not condemnation to death or to persistent failure. Drug use is preventable.



IGNS & SYMPTOMS OF DRUG USE

- A drop in school marks;
- Losing interest in matters previously important like school, sport and hobbies;
- Neglect of personal appearance and hygiene;
- Sudden change in a appetite of an unexplained change in weight;
- Unpredictable behaviour;
- Secretive behaviour and lying;
- Losing old friends and ganging out with a new crowd;
- A deterioration in health;

SANCA DRUGS AWARENESS WEEK



IS AN ORGANISATION THAT HELPS PEOPLE WHO ARE SUFFERING FROM DRUGS.

WHAT CAN YOU AS A PARENT DO IF YOU SUSPECT YOUR CHILD IS USING DRUGS?

TIPS FROM SANCA:

◆ Do not make false accusations. If your concern is justified, get as much information as possible regarding the drug (s). This information is freely available in all public libraries. Discuss this abuse in a calm manner with your child while expressing your concern and worry. Negotiate some house-rules which specifically include the immediate stopping of all drug use.

SOME POINTS TO REMEMBER

- Do not ignore the problem hoping that it will go away.
- Confront your child with a list of evidence you have gathered which indicates that he /she is using drugs.
- Do not make threats, get hysterical of lose your temper. Rather, discuss the situation calmly from a position of love and concern.
- If your child admits to using drugs, insist that he stop immediately. If he finds it difficult to stop, seek professional help eg. SANCA ALCOHOL AND DRUG CENTRE.
- If he denies that he is using drugs, tell him that you expect a change in his behavior.
- Both parents, even if divorced, need to adopt a united approach in dealing with the issue.
- Find support—talk to a doctor, religious leader or social worker

who is knowledgeable about drug abuse.

Remember that drug abuse is not a symptom of a poor upbringing. It can happen in any family.
