Emmaus hospital is encouraging all males in Okhahlamba to be circumcised. The MMC team is working hard in mobilising not only boys but men to come and be circumcised. Here are the facts that you need to know before coming.

Advantages why men need to circumcised:

- Reduce HIV -if used with a condom
- Personal hygiene purposes
- eases and cervix cancer-if used with a condom

count above 500 this will ensure that you heal properly.

Health education is done prior surgery, during and after surgery care.

Post operation review is done after 48 hours, 7 days, 21 days and 28 days

Reducing exposure to sexual transmitted dis- 618 clients were circumcised In the 4th guarter of 2016/2017

#### Procedure to follow:

- Start with having your Hiv status checked as well as Blood pressure, pulse, TB screening and haemoglobin
- If you test positive you must have a CD4

On 27 March 2017 Mpiloyethu clinic was involved in the TB awareness programme that was held at Khethani community hall in Winterton in recognition of TB awareness month.

We as Mpiloyethu clinic offered the following services to clients:

- Cervical screening (Pap-smears)
- Vital screening (blood pressure, glucometer checking, temperature and pulse).
- TB screening
- PICT
- Health education
- Condom distribution
- cervical screen on a total of 4 clients.
- vital screening on a total of 65 clients.
- 6 clients, took sputum specimens
- PICT on a total of 17 clients.
- health education to 109 clients that were in the community hall about TB awareness and signs of TB. As well as distributed a total of 100 female condoms and 3400 male condoms.

We were also joined by HST and Mobile clinic 2.

# **HPV CAMPAIGN**



From the 21 till 28th of February 2017 the school health teams went out on a provincial Human papillomavirus (HPV) campaign. This campaign aims at reducing the chances of girls of getting cervical cancer.

The vaccine is given to young girls in grade 4 which are nine(9) years and older because it has been identified that the vaccine is mostly affective between this age.

Emmaus hospital school health teams managed to vaccinate most of the girls. The ones that were not vaccinated did not qualify as the parents had not signed the consent form

Parents are encouraged to sign the consent forms for the next HPV campaign which will run from the 22-27 September 2017
