WORLD PREMATURITY DAY

Since 2011, November 17 has been recognized as World Prematurity Day in order to give visibility to this problem, raise awareness of the needs and rights of premature babies and their families, raise awareness of the importance of experience and quality care from the health system and, thus, advance policies that guarantee the full rights of both babies and families. Emmaus Hospital on this day took time to celebrate this day with Moms who were admitted with their premature babies.

Dr Dunn in her speech said skin -to-skin contact has proven to be an extremely beneficial and effective practice, especially important in the case of premature babies. It is initiated immediately after birth, its practice contributes to the initiation and sustaining of breastfeeding, favors the stabilization of vital parameters such as heart rate and blood glucose levels, and helps the establishment of a healthy micro biota, aspects of importance both in the process of adaptation to extra uterine life after birth and in the medium and long term. It also aids relaxation and deep sleep. As long as clinical stability allows, skin-to-skin contact in premature infants is essential for a healthy and sensitive experience. Dr Dunn thanked the mothers for co operating with the health care team as this also needs dedication from the mother.

One of the Mothers in her speech said she had never thought that her child who was 0.17 kg would survive and be a fully fleshed baby who is now weighing 3.9 KG and is ready to go home. She







WORLD ANTIMICROBIAL WEEK

"Keeping antimicrobials effective is everybody's responsibility"

The World Antimicrobial Awareness Week (WAAW) campaign is held annually between 18-24 November, with the aim of: :

• increasing awareness of global antimicrobial resistance (AMR), and encouraging best practices among the public, health workers, farmers, animal health professionals and policy makers, in order to prevent further resistance and the spread of drug-resistant infections. The theme of the 2022 campaign was:

PREVENTING ANTIMICROBIAL RESISTANCE TOGETHER.

Between 18-24 November 2022, Emmaus Hospital Pharmacy held the following activities to promote the above aims::

- Patient education talks
- Presentations to health professionals, focusing on the nurses role in Antimicrobial Stewardship.
- An Antimicrobial Resistance Ouiz for staff members
- A skit performed on Quality Day, highlighting the misuse of antibiotics

Antimicrobial Resistance parade through the hospital teaching clients the following:

Antimicrobial resistance:

• occurs when an organism mutates / changes and therefore can no longer be treated by an antimicrobial that should inhibit or destroy it, thus reducing the effectiveness of antimicrobials to treat infections; and is resulting in multi-drug resistant infections e.g. MDR-TB & XDR-TB

The misuse, overuse, and inappropriate use of antimicrobials contributes to antimicrobial resistance. Often this is due to INCORRECT use of antibiotics, using antibiotics when not needed, using the wrong

antibiotic for infection, or using it for the wrong amount of time.

Patient impact of antimicrobial resistant infections

Treatment failures, recurring infections, longer hospital stays, longer recovery times, a higher risk of mortality or long term implications, significant financial cost of treatment

- Encouraging people to:
- o wash their hands regularly,
- O prepare food hygienically, avoid close contact with sick people, and keep vaccinations up to date, all of which can affect the control or spread of AMR at home, at the workplace or in health care setting.






THANKS GIVING PRAYER


