NURSE'S DAY



It is increasing common between 35 and 70 years. It is usually starts as a painless lump in the breast later there is considerable fibrosis around it that may cause nipple retraction, necrosis and even ulceration of the overlying skin.

Early spread beyond the breast is via lymph to the axillary and luternal mammary uodes. Local invasion involves the peetoral muscles and pleura. It may later be carried by blood to many other organs and bones especially lumber and thoracic vertebrae.

The causes of breast cancer are not known, but an important predisposing factor appears to be high oeshogen exposure. Women with early menarche, late menopause and no pregnancies have a higher than normal risk because they experience more menstrual cycles in the lifetime and each monthly cycle brings with it the oestrogen surge seen in the proliferative phase of the cycle. A genetic component is also likely with close relatives of cancer suffers having a significantly elevated risk of developing the disease. One percent of all breast cancer occurs in men.

Turmour found on BSE are usaually smaller, associated with a better prognosis and are more easily treated with breast-conserving surgery. Although many women are fearful of BSE, thorough instruction by a nurse or physical can alleviate auxiety.

Routine mammography reduces breast cancer by 25-35 % in asymptomatic women. The American Cancer SOR. Recommend baseline mammogram between ages 35-39.



BREAST EXAMINATION

It can be done by self or physician which begins with visual inspection for asymmetry in breast size; nipple inversion, bulging or dimpling. On underlying lump an be detected by having the women press both hands against the hips or the palms together in front of the forehead. This contracts the pectoral muscles and subtle dimpling of the skin may appear.

The breast should be palpated with the palmar surface of the second, third and 4th finger moving systematically in small circular pattern from the nipple to the outer edges as it along the spokes of a wheel.


The wermam should be in a supine position with the ipsitateral arm raised above her head and aa pillow under the shoulder ipsilateral to the breast being examined while she examines the breast with her contralateral hand using the technique stated above.

The hand washing campaign aims to improve the hand washing practices of all clinical; non clinical; patients and visitors to the health care facilities. Infection Prevention and Control activities that were conducted during the IPC Week are as follows:

Monday 14 October 2013: Hand Washing Campaign at Sifisokuhle F.S Primary School

Emmaus Hospital's Infection Prevention and Control Coordinator (IPCC) Sr. Kella Dunne launched the Hand Washing Campaign during a community IPC Visit to Sifisokuhle F.S Primary School. Sifisokuhle F.S Primary School was selected to participate in in the Hand washing Campaign as it is a Health Promoting School. Sr. Dunne gave health education and demonstrated the hand washing and cough etiquette to 812 pupils from Grades 1-8. This information sharing session was a fun interactive session where the pupils were encouraged to participate and a few lucky pupils who participated in the health talk were given a bar of Lux Body soap

Winterton Spar generously donated 100 bars of Lux body soap towards Emmaus Hand washing Campaign. 40 of these Lux body soap bars were donated to the pu-

Wednesday 16TH October 2013: IPC Support Visits to Clinics – Hand Washing Campaign:

Sr. K.Dunne IPCC, conducted IPC Support Visits to the Clinics accompanied by Mrs. Thabile Mkhize – District CDC Coordinator. The target group for the Hand Washing Campaign was the Nursing staff, non-clinical staff, patients and visitors in the Health Care Facilities. The Clinics' visited were Busingatha Clinic; Mazizini Clinic; Oliviershoek Clinic; Dukuza Clinic and Bergville Clinic.

Sr. K.Dunne IPCC, conducted in-service training on Hand washing/hand hygiene in the patients waiting areas of the clinics, in an attempt to the in-service training/health education to reach as many people as possible. Discussed was the hand washing technique, which was demonstrated to the staff; patients and visitors, as well as why and how to use the alcohol hand spray on entering and leaving the clinics sand other health care facilities. The in-service training session was interactive, staff and patients were encouraged to participate. The patients seemed to enjoy this approach and participated in the Health Education. It was encouraging to hear that the patients and visitors were able to answer correctly as to when to wash their hands.

Mrs. Thabile Mkhize the CDC Coordinator from District office a gave health education talk to the patients and visitors, on Community Surveillance – which included how to identify Measles; Acute Flaccid Paralysis; the management and reporting of dog bites, the of importance if compliance to treatment regimens for Diabetes; Hypertension and AIDS and TB.
