

Worldwide obesity has more than doubled since 1980.

The highest rate of obesity and overweight among adults in sub-Saharan Africa is found in South African women at 42% while the combined rate of both overweight and obesity is 69.3%

In 2014, more than 1.9 billion adults, 18 years and older, were overweight. Of these over 600 million were obese. 39% of adults aged 18 years and over were overweight in 2014, and 13% were obese (WHO 2015)



CEO REFLECTING BACK ON PSV WEEK

Public Service Volunteer Week started on the 13th of July 2015 and ended on the 17 July 2015. I was deployed to ward 11 which covered Inkomokazini and Mqedandaba Area. On the 14th of July we went back to the interventions that were done in 2013 and found that all those who were profiled were given houses and so I was very impressed by that. We came across an old crèche in Inkomokazini to be used as Thula Mntwana Centre where we manage to rebuild all its broken parts using mud and cow dung, that was an experience for me since I've never built anything in my life. Whilst profiling we came across a family of 7, living under one room which was made of mud and they had nothing to eat. The following day Counsellor Mr Sithole and I went to Spar to buy them groceries. We came across other houses with a similar situation but not as bad as the first family. On the 17th I was in my overalls, we painted Phasiwe Primary school and later had a function hosted by the Mayor of Imbabazane Mrs. Strydom where we gave out walking sticks to about 30 to 40 of the elderly that were there. I have to say that this was a wonderful experience for me I enjoyed it. It is the heart that does the giving, the fingers only let go.

FAMILY HEALTH TEAM OPEN DAY WEMBEZI CLINIC









Wembezi Clinic hosted an open day event on the 28th of July 2015 where they were formally introducing their two formed Family Health teams to the Wembezi community which are lead by the two outreached leaders who go by the names of SR Sithole and SR Nyathi. This initiative started in 2013 where the two came and stated this without giving up. The CCGs are the formal members that make up the Family Health teams. The two teams cater for the whole of Wembezi location community under ward 1,2 and ward 3. The teams go by the slogan of "Bringing Life to the people". They do home visits and their main roles and responsibilities are promoting health prevention and disease, assessment diagnosis and referring households members to the relevant stakeholders. They encourage pregnant mother for early bookings, point natal visits at 3days. They do thorough checks of health chart immunization, growth monitoring, vitamin A Zentel to Children under the age of 5 years. They encourage teenagers for family planning, pap smears, recruitment for male medical circumcision, HCT Service and TB screening.

They give advise on Adult-chronic disease screening and treatment adherence, screening for HIV/AIDS and TB, Trace defaulter on chronic medication. The teams are playing a very big role in the community and are making a big difference and they are changing the lives of the people in a good way. They always attend war room meetings and interviews. They also plan and execute awareness campaigns. They support the Phila Mntwana Centres in Wembezi. They do household champions programs through WBOT which is aimed at achieving health oriented and self reliant households around the community. The Family Health teams statistics from Ward BASE outreach will assist in the increase of the PHC Head count. Through starting this initiative for the community the members encountered a lot of challenges, mainly transport problems, travelling on terrain –gravel roads, poverty conditions in house-holds, food security and delay when seeking health. They lacked support from the staff and lacked equipment. But non the less they did not give up because they saw the need and are trying very hard to fill in the gap. They collaborated with other stakeholders such as DSD, SASSA, Clinics, Hospital and Home Affairs.

is in support for the


