Senior Citizens are the custodians of our communities; we depend on them for advice and guidance; for telling us and our children fairy tales; for love, care and warmth; for making us laugh and for keeping our families strong.

But recent shameful activities in our communities have been happening consequently to them. They get mugged, raped by people as young as their grandchildren, they are abused to give up their pension money to feed the urges of their drugaddicted children and grandchildren, they are victims of planned crimes and get fooled by people who promise to invest their money instead utilise the money for themselves, they even become victims of the brutalities of mashonisas.

The Social Services and Crisis Centre departments so a need to celebrate adulthood and ensure the attendants who were senior citizens from different areas how much they are loved and how to protect themselves from social evils. They were also given information on health issues associated with senior people like diabe-
