- -Conduct daily breast self-examination to early detect breast cancer

- -Protect themselves from getting infected with HIV/AIDS.
- -If you are already infected with HIV/AIDS, properly take your ARV medication
- -Getting out of abusive relationships
- -Hygiene
- -Breastfeeding exclusively for 6 months for new mothers
- -Child health and family planning
- -Getting out of debts and living affordable lifestyles
