In response to the Provincial call on fighting HIV and AID's, Ilembe Health District hosted a male medical circumcision camp at Vukile High School at Mapumulo Sub district, on 7 & 8 July 2010.

The purpose of the camp was not only to circumcise boys but it was also to educate them about moral values and responsibilities. This was the first camp to be held in this district, and it was a huge success. Province had set the district a target of 150, but this was exceeded by 51. The total number of boys that were circumcised was 201. There were no adverse events reported.

Thanks to all stakeholders for making this a huge success.






THE SUCCESS OF POLIO AND MEASLES CAMPAIGN

lembe Health District successfully conducted Polio and Measles campaign from 12 to 30 April 2010 (First Round) and the second round was from 22 May to 16 July 2010, as part of National Department of Health's initiative.

The district's target population for polio under 5 years is 67511(This figure includes all four sub districts). The target for measles under 5 years was 60897 and measles under 15 years was 145837.



THE DISTRICT OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH & SAFETY MANAGER SHARES INFORMATION THAT ADDRESSES THE FREQUENTLY ASKED QUES-TIONS.

WHAT IS OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH AND SAFETY?

This is the programme which implements the Occupational Health and Safety Act number 85 of 1993 to ensure that all employees and users of our facilities are in a safe and healthy environment.

WHAT IS COID ACT?

This is the abbreviation for **Compensation Of Injuries** and **Diseases** Act 130 of 1993 which regulates the compensation of employees who get injured while on duty. It has terms and conditions, not everybody get compensated.

I AM INVOLVED IN A CAR ACCIDENT WHILE DRIV-ING A GOVERNMENT VEHICLE, AM I COVERED BY COID ACT?

Only those people authorized traveling in a government vehicle are covered by COID Act

Who is an authorized person?

- The person who is driving the government vehicle and appears on the trip sheet as a driver, a co-driver or a passenger on an official trip.
- If your duty requires that you are transported to and from your working area by the government vehicle, you are also covered by COID Act

Please note - it is very important for all authorized occupants of the government vehicle to be in possession of identity name tags.

You are not authorized and therefore not covered by COID Act if you are involved in an accident with government vehicle and yet.

- You have a subsidized car in your name
- You have been given a "lift" by the driver
- Your name does not appear on the trip sheet
 - You are not a government employee and no permission has been granted by the department of health authorities, district *"Your Health is* fleet manager or transport officer from *your* the respective institution for you to be transported by a government vehicle

WHAT IS INJURY ON DUTY?

This is an injury sustained by the employee while performing or he/she is in the line of performing his / her duties

I HAD AN INJURY ON DUTY AND I WENT TO MY DOCTOR USING MY MEDICAL AID, I NEED TO BE RE IMBURSED- WHAT SHOULD I DO?

Please remember that the government is subsidizes you with 2/3 (two third) of the total amount of your medical aid contribution, and you will continue receiving you full salary while you are not at work because of the injury you sustained on duty. There is no money that you will receive, instead upon receiving all the necessary documentation and receipts as proof of payments made toward medical costs the Department of Labour will reimburse your medical aid.

PREVENTION IS SUPERIOR TO CURE: STRIVE TO BE ALWAYS SAFE

MALARIA SAFETY:



- Be aware of the malaria areas, take precautions when traveling in these areas
- While in the malaria area remain indoors from dusk to dawn. Malaria carrying mosquitoes bite most at night.
- Malaria symptoms include fever and flu– like illness. If diagnosed early, the decrease is usually cured.
- Wear light-colored clothing, with long sleeves, long pants and socks.



- Rabies is prevalent in KwaZulu-Natal.
- Treat all dogs as not being vaccinated
- If you are bitten by a dog, present yourself for treatment as soon as possible to prevent death from rabies.
- Continue to visit the Doctor or Clinic until the course of treatment is complete.

CHOLERA:



- It is possible to contract cholera in KwaZulu Natal, should you be exposed to people with Cholera
- Use only purified, treated or boiled water.
- Wash all raw food with purified, treated or boiled water before eating it. WASH hands before handling and eating food, after using the toilet, after changing nappies/diapers
- If you are unsure of the status of the water, do not drink or use it.
- Do not contaminate rivers or leave sewage where it can be washed into a river by rain.

TUBERCULOSIS (TB)

- TB is a major health problem in KwaZulu Natal, however the risk to travelers is minimal.
- Cover your mouth when coughing.
- TB can be cured with little or no complications.
- The prescribed course of treatment must be completed and this is usually takes 6 months.
- Failure to complete the treatment may lead to such complications as multi-Drug resistant (MDR) TB or Extreme Drug Resistant (XDR) TB-both of which are very difficult to cure. So comply with the first course of treatment Please!!!

- Make the right choice! Alcoholic and other drugs are highly addictive and abuse of these substances has a very serious impact on the mind and body. Many of the primary effects of alcohol abuse occur from episodes of acute alcoholic intoxication.
- Acute alcoholic intoxication is also associated with unsafe sexual practices and increased risk of contracting a sexually transmitted disease and opportunistic diseases.

The blood alcohol limit for professional driver is 0.02%- one beer puts you over the limit!

Biyela ensured that distribution of condoms was done at all service the dedicated FIFA viewing sites and other crowded areas like Sabuyazi Sports Ground, Taxi Ranks, Kranskop High School (Maphumulo Sub District), Recreation Sport ground, Tarvens, Libraries (KwaDukuza Sub District), Nombika Sport ground, Bhamshela (Ndwedwe Sub District), Mandeni Sports ground in Mandeni Sub District.


