ACCIDENT & EMERGENCY DIRECTORATE

Mchunu told EZASEKHANGELA that there are patients mostly from KwaMashu who are brought to the hospital's Casualty Unit with minor lacerations and bruises.

"This creates a problem as most of them have no bus-fare to go home," she said. Recently, KZN Department of Health's Corporate

HUMAN RESOURCES ISSUES

King Edward VIII Hospital became the first public hospital in South Africa to appoint the Deputy Director: Human Resources. Mr Mboneni Bhekiswayo was the first person to occupy the seat and now it is Mr Bafana Magubane (see picture left). This year EZASEKHANGELA will dedicate this column to the Human Resource Department. Today the focus is on the Leave Dispensation for Public Servants.

Annual Leave entitlement

- Depending on years of service in the Public Service and the employing sector, employees are entitled to annual leave at the beginning of each annual leave cycle. The leave cycle stretches from 1 January to 31 December each year.
- Annual leave are to be utilized in the annual leave cycle. If not possible, not later than 6 months after the expiry of the annual leave cycle.
- Unused annual leave are to be forfeited after the expiry of the above mentioned 6 months period.
- Public servants are paid the equivalent of the cash value of unused annual leave entitlements at termination of service.

Sick Leave entitlements

- Public servants are entitled to 36 working days sick leave in three-year cycle.
- Unused sick leave entitlements are not carried forward at the expiry of the three-year period.
- Employees who have exhausted the 36 days may, based on medical evidence, be granted temporary or permanent disability leave.
- During the leave period the department must investigate the nature of the disability with a view to inform the decision to be taken.

Despite inadequate staffing, the Infection Control Unit has managed to create awareness in the Wards about infection control precautionary measures. Manned by two Chief Professional nurses, the main aim of this unit is to prevent, identify and control the spread of infection – which may be hospital or community acquired infection.

The unit's Mrs D. Zimu has praised a number of departments for co-operating with her unit. Operating Theatres, Intensive Care Unit, Neonatal Nursery and the Mortuary are some of the departments that are reportedly fully aware of infection control measures. "There is good rapport between these departments and infection control unit. Problems are reported to us immediately and are attended to in order to prevent any potential disaster," Mrs D Zimu explained.

King Edward VIII Hospital provides regional tertiary service to the entire province, with the population of approximately 9 million, and some parts of the Mpumalanga Eastern Cape provinces. Most wards in the Obstetric & Gynaecology Department are always full of patients - keeping these wards clean has proved to be a major challenge. General assistants try hard to keep these departments clean.
