THE KZN MEC FOR HEALTH, DR S.M. DLOMO OFFICIALLY OPENS A NEW MDR UNIT IN MANGUZI HOSPITAL.

The building of the MDR complex was completed in mid August 2009, but because of the urgency to provide isolation for the MDR patients, who were otherwise, juxtaposed through out the "isolation corners" of the general wards, patients were moved in on the 1st of September 2009. It was an honour to be visited by our KZN Health MEC for Health Dr Sibongiseni Dlomo for the official opening of the MDR complex. The day we have all been waiting for came on the 29th of April 2010. The beautiful MDR complex was built by Stedone Hazy Crest Projects. Apart from the ululations of joy for a new complex, the presence of the district and community key figures was another reason for joy. Among the dignitaries were Inkosi of the Tembe tribe, local councilors, the district management, local district hospital management teams, etc. In his official opening speech, the MEC emphasized that TB is curable as long as the patient has followed all the steps of the treatment program and ensuring that there is DOT Supporters to take on the supervision of patient outside the hospital. The new MDR complex has got 40 beds (20 females and 20 male patients) and it caters for patients from Mseleni; Bethesda and Mosvold Hospitals. The complex is the first of its kind in the district.
