Speaking today, 2 July 2010 following a visit to two camps sites in Madadeni Hospital and Ezakheni FET respectively, Dr Mkhize said the people of KwaZulu-Natal had once again demonstrated their commitment to work together to build a better future for our children and our country.

The MEC will be joined by the Minister of Health, Dr Aaron Motsoeledi, over the week-end who will also don his white coat and a scalpel to circumcise boys at camps in Gamalakhe, uMzimkhulu (on Saturday) and Eshowe (Sunday).
