KwaZulu-Natal Department of Health Joins the World Hand Hygiene Campaign to Save Lives

Health care associated infections (HCAI) remain a concern for the KwaZulu-Natal Department of Health. However, hand hygiene is the simplest and most effective intervention in reducing HCAIs. For healthcare workers, there are five recognised moments for hand hygiene within a healthcare setting within the health environment - before patient contact, before performing a aseptic task, after exposure to body fluids, after patient contact and after contact with patient surroundings.

"Hand hygiene is the most fundamental principle of infection prevention. When correctly practised, this basic and cost effective intervention saves lives," says KwaZulu-Natal MEC for Health, Dr Sibongiseni Dhlomo. "There are many factors that influence compliance to hand hygiene in the clinical setting. However, the availability of alcohol hand rubs, hand wash basins and soap and hand drying materials is not in itself sufficient to improve hand hygiene practise. For improved compliance, these basics must be coupled with educational activities aimed at creating hand hygiene awareness. Every healthcare worker must make an individual commitment to consistently adhere to the 5 moments for hand hygiene."

World Hand Hygiene Day, which is being commemorated on 05 May 2015, is an initiative by the World Health Organization (WHO) to underscore the importance of hand hygiene in the health sector and to create awareness of this practice. SAVE LIVES: Clean Your Hands - is WHO's global call to action for all healthcare workers this commemorative day.

Around the world, in participating facilities, healthcare workers will pass a 'baton' of alcohol hand rub to fellow healthcare workers. The number of participants per facility will be submitted to the WHO for tallying and it is hoped that this initiative will win a place in the Guinness World Records for the relay with the most participants. Individual healthcare workers may enter the design a poster competition. A public and a private health care facility with the most interesting activity in support of world hand hygiene day will each receive the Hand Hygiene floating trophy for 2015.
