
KZN Health MEC, Dr Sibongiseni Dhlomo announces readiness of EMS services for 2016 festive season at Marian hill toll plaza

In essence, during this time of the year the capability of the Emergency Medical Services, Road Traffic Inspectorate, Fire Emergency Services, South African Police Services, and



As a Department, we have long accepted that our Province attracts a large number of local and international travellers and visitors at this time of the year. These visitors inadvertently end up needing emergency care and hospitalisation when involved in accidents. This as expected puts a big strain to our already overburdened healthcare institution. For all the crashes that occur, the Department of Health has to bear the brunt and the cost as almost all the victims end up either in our hospitals or in our mortuaries.

It starts with our Paramedics who are routinely the first on the scene of an accident who have to quickly assess the situation and determine the proper course of action for each patient.

At healthcare institutions, we rely on these Paramedics for all the prehospital care as they are trained to resuscitate and/or stabilise patients using sophisticated techniques, equipment and drugs whilst driving the patient to earmarked hospital.

It remains our fervent wish that more and more people can strive to obey the rules of the road as most of those that get involved in accidents end up in our Intensive Care Unit which are very costly to manage.

Even after their spell in the ICU's; most accident victims go on to require after-


hospitalisation care which then puts another strain on family members who have to care for this member who may have lost a limb or is now incapable of taking good care of him/herself.

One other purpose for our today's launch is to announce that our Forensic Pathology Service is on standby and working closely with the South African Police Services in collection of deceased bodies from both the accident and crime scenes.
