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It was an opportunity of a lifetime when 20 staffers were taught sign language by St. Martins de Pores Comprehensive School. On this day they were awarded certificates after passing the exams.

Staffers had to attend classes twice a week for 1 month. These classes aimed at improving communication between staff and deaf/mute clients since departments are regularly assessed if they have a functional system in place of attending to deaf, blind, foreign and illiterate patients.

In 2008 the Community Service Therapists identified the need to initiate a quality improvement project involving general stimulation of children in the crèche who were not referred for individual therapy.

Many of these children spent at least 2 weeks in hospital, and therefore were removed from their normal home/school environment and were not receiving the necessary physical, perceptual and cognitive stimulation they required to ensure normal development. A weekly stimulation program was launched.

This involved weekly sessions presented by 2 therapists of the multidisciplinary team including Occupational Therapists, Physiotherapists, Audiologists, Speech Therapists and Dieticians. The aim of this program was also to equip staff working in the crèche with skills and ideas to ensure the children receive appropriate stimulation on a daily basis

This project continued to flourish in 2009. In 2010, Nurse Gumbi approached the Rehab Team with an idea to paint the outside of the crèche. The Community Service Therapists agreed that with careful planning, this task would further enhance development of these children. Specific designs were chosen to develop cognitive skills such as counting, colour and shape identification; perceptual skills such as object constancy and figure grounds and fine motor skills such as writing.

Tarren 't Hart, the Community Service Occupational Therapist spearheaded the project and secured sponsorship of paints and brushes. These were kindly sponsored by Ideal Homes Estate Agency in Umtentweni and a painter by the name of Ian Kuhn.

We would like to take the opportunity to acknowledge the Community Service Therapists for their enthusiasm and dedication to continuously improving Rehab service delivery. Thank you also to the sponsors who make these endeavours possible. Beside painting the crèche the therapists also coordinated other health awareness campaigns such as stroke awareness week, deaf awareness week breastfeeding week, garden projects and more.

Murchison has hosted numerous successful MMC Campaigns. The community response to the call is and continue to be overwhelming.

These MMC campaigns are coordinated from the clinics where a patient gets tested for HIV/aids and is booked for circumcision procedure which is done at the hospital every Mondays and Fridays. Clinics play a major role in mobilizing the communities. EMRS provided transport for patients

In addition to weekly circumcision massive campaigns are coordinated. Three massive campaigns have been coordinated from January 2011 and were scheduled as follows:-

- 14 January at Imbunde clinic 37 males were circumcised
- 28 January at Izingolweni Clinic 48 males were circumcised
- 08 April at the hospital 97 patients were circumcised.

Two major winter campaigns are due on 27 June and 04 July 2011.

During the campaigns upon arrival detailed health education is given which also clarify the myths related to circumcision such as circumcised males cannot be affected by HIV/AIDS, etc.

Participants are told that this is an initiative to reduce sexual transmitted diseases, educators emphasize that people must practice safe sex at all times.

The MMC and HCT teams are commended for ensuring that this campaign runs smoothly.

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HCT CAMPAIGN HELD AT BUNGES

.On Thursday, 14 April 2011 The Murchison Hospital H.C.T team visited Mr Bunge's farm. Farm workers were keen to be part of this initiative 57 people participated but others refused because they felt it was an unnecessary exercise. People were screened for Blood Pressure, TB, diabetes, anemia and HIV.

On arrival health education was given to all workers emphasizing the importance of healthy lifestyle which included practicing safe sex and knowing ones status. They were also informed of their rights of refusing testing as the farm manager insisted that all her workers be tested. Workers were also informed about the male circumcision campaign and the importance of circumcising by all males to reduce the risk of being easily infected with HIV and STI's. On the same breath they were warned that circumcising does not mean that people should stop using condoms.

Workers wanted to be screened for all diseases because for them it was a rear opportunity since the nearby clinic is situated few kilometers away and they do not get time to be screened for diseases. As a result comprehensive health education was given to address all their health concerns. The Bunge farm staff members thought that the campaign was a big and a positive contribution to their lives.

Even though the HCT team was not provided with adequate resources to run the campaign but the purpose of HCT campaign was accomplished. Staff were working seated, kneeling or standing on the grass but we pride ourselves for doing a sterling job for the community.


