My personal delight stems from the solemn covenant you have made with the Department of Health, that you are available to tend and cater for the sick, the frail and the traumatised where ever they are. Our people in the rural areas, where most of us come from, are bound to be the biggest beneficiaries of your commitment and generosity.
